1.0 BACKGROUND AND KEY ISSUES

1.1 This report provides an update on progress in relation to the ongoing work programme being undertaken in support of the Wirral West Constituency Committee. This is set out in the 'action tracker' attached at **Appendix 1**. Particular items for noting are highlighted below in the main body of the report.

2.0 WIRRAL WEST COMMUNITY FUND

- 2.1 The Committee recommended at its meeting of the 3rd July 2014 that the Constituency Manager be given delegated authority to develop the Community Fund grants programme for allocating the Committee's £50,000 core budget (i.e. £10,000 per ward).
- 2.2 It proposed that the timetable for the Community Fund is as follows:

2.3 The application and voting process is currently being refined to reflect the suggestions from community groups who responded to the evaluation questionnaire and which were set out in the previous report to Committee of the 3rd July, i.e.:

- Reviewing the online voting system to ensure that information about the projects and the options for voting are clear;
- Allowing more time for preparation and better, more effective publicity to increase the level of awareness and support that the wider community;
- Ensuring locations for voting events are easily accessible and give careful consideration to dates and times, as well as the use of 'A' boards to draw people in;
- Thinking again about whether groups should give an informal presentation about their project as part of a more structured event.
- 2.4 It is also proposed that the terms and conditions of the Community Fund are refreshed. Whilst the maximum grant will remain at the £1,000 threshold previously put in place, applications for funding above this amount will be considered. The aim of this will be to encourage exceptional projects which have a significant impact on local areas or the constituency as a whole.

3.0 'HAVE YOUR SAY' EVENTS

- 3.1 The second 'have your say' marketplace event took place on Thursday 18th September at Fender Primary, Woodchurch (Upton Ward) and had representatives from a number of organisations who were on hand to answer questions from members of the public and give updates on services and activities in the area. In addition, groups funded by the Constituency Committee were asked to attend and share information on their projects and network with others. As for the first event, attendees welcomed the opportunity to have face to face informal conversations and discuss local issues.
- 3.2 The approach to these events will be further developed and publicised. The scheduled dates for future marketplace engagement events are as follows:
 - Thursday 11th December 2014, 7 p.m., Greasby, Frankby and Irby Ward (venue to be confirmed);
 - Thursday 26th March 2015, 7 p.m., West Kirby and Thurstaston Ward (venue to be confirmed);
 - Thursday 18th June 2015, 7 p.m., Pensby and Thingwall Ward (venue to be confirmed).

4.0 WIRRAL WEST COMMUNITY FUND / PUBLIC HEALTH PROJECTS

4.1 The constituency team are working proactively with groups to support projects funded by the Committee in March 2014 and to monitor progress. Project highlights include:

KH2 Community Link Services was awarded just over £2,300 to deliver a 'sporting memories' programme for older people in the Hoylake area. The first meeting was in May when staff at Royal Liverpool Golf Club spoke to the group about preparing the course for the 2014 Open. This was later followed up with a visit to Royal Liverpool and an informative, entertaining talk on the Club's history. More recently, the National Football Museum in Manchester visited the group bringing a range of football memorabilia which prompted many sporting memories from group members. The group are also collectively working on a project 'Played in Wirral' mapping the

sporting venues that have disappeared or moved, such as Parkgate baths, the Speedway Track at New Brighton or horse racing on Leasowe beach. As a totally new concept for bringing people together, i.e. talking about sport, interest in the group has been promising and numbers continue to grow. Three or four clients attend from Hoylake Cottage Hospital, which has fed back that "these monthly meetings are becoming very popular, particularly with our men. There is much discussion after the event and we hope it will continue next year!"

The **Festival of Firsts** was awarded £926 to include a Festi-Velo bike parade as part of the festival in July 2014, which will be the first of its kind in the UK outside the City of Bristol. The Festi-velo event attracted over 120 individual bike riders of all ages and abilities from very small children to more elderly members of the community from all over Wirral. The popularity it received because it as a new event exceeded their expectations – as they were hoping for about 50 bikes maximum. The event provided a festive spectacle that was appreciated by thousands of members of the public in Hoylake, Meols and West Kirby. The situation also promoted cycling as a fun and accessible healthy activity for people of all ages. Feedback from evaluation forms was very positive with everyone calling the Festivelo a "real buzz".

The **Melrose Wednesday Club** was awarded £3,000 to develop its weekly sessions for children and young people in Hoylake. The Club brings together children from particular parts of West Kirby and Hoylake, providing a series of music lessons. The children involved are continuously growing in confidence, playing Tin Whistles and Violins both within the Club and at home, getting ready for each class. The children are even working towards a concert to be held at the end of term – an opportunity like this would not have been possible without the grant. The Wednesday Club also put on a Summer School as part of the project, where local children experienced a variety of activities, including circus skills.

The **St Bridget's Centre Management Committee** was awarded £1,000 towards the cost of audio-visual equipment for the Beacon Room to extend use of the Centre. This project has purchased and installed some audio visual equipment in one of the larger rooms within the Centre. The first use was by the Museum Group for their Heritage Open Day in September 2014 and the facility is now being publicised to develop interest and training and support is also on offer.

Fruit to Suit was awarded just under £2,700 to work with schools to establish healthy tuck shop businesses. Fruit to Suit has now trained three schools to set up and run a healthy tuck shop. They are all in the process of writing their business plans and preparing for launch! Of the children involved so far:

- 76% enjoyed the Creating a Company Challenge
- 85% felt they learnt about setting up your own business
- 56% had never considered setting up their own business before the Challenge
- 67% would now consider setting up their own business
- 81% felt they learned new facts about healthy eating
- 85% would recommend us to another school

5.0 NEIGHBOURHOOD WORKING – DEVELOPMENT OF BUSINESS CASE

- 5.1 At its meeting in July, the Committee resolved that, in noting the priorities identified by local people as part of the Community Fund voting process which took place earlier the year, the Committee requests that these should be taken into account in respect of the work being undertaken by the Council and Executive to develop proposals for the further devolution of budgets, functions and responsibilities to the Constituency Committees. The Committee further requested that the Constituency Manager prepare a report for the next meeting of the Committee on how these proposals are progressing with a view to producing a business case thereafter.
- 5.2 The Committee is asked to note that this work is ongoing and that a detailed report will be presented to the next meeting in February 2015. As with all areas of the constituency work programme, members of the Committee will be consulted on these proposals as appropriate.

6.0 PUBLIC HEALTH UNDERSPEND

- 6.1 At the Wirral West Constituency Committee on the 3rd July, the Committee agreed that the Constituency Manager be given delegated authority to use the Committee's Public Health Outcomes Fund underspend from 2013-14 (£5,633.77) for partnership working with the voluntary, community and faith sector to support older people. Working closely with Merseyside Fire and Rescue Service, a partnership project is now being taking forward with the following aims:
 - To support older people in the constituency to keep safe, warm and well in their own homes this winter;
 - To reduce social isolation amongst older people in Wirral West;
 - To develop stronger links between partners and volunteers working in the constituency
- 6.2 The key elements of the project will be to:
 - Establish a constituency winter campaign team, made up of partner staff and local volunteers. Members of the Constituency Committee are also of course welcome to be part of this team. It is anticipated that a launch event will take place in the constituency in November;
 - Establish a dynamic 'store' of information and equipment to be given out during the campaign, including winter warmth packs and a range of equipment identified by Merseyside Fire and Rescue Service;
 - Identify and attend local events and forums already planned throughout the winter to promote key messages;
 - Allocate funding to voluntary, community and faith sector organisations to
 organise additional events in areas of the constituency where gaps are identified;
 - Provide transport for older people to attend local events where this is a barrier for them;
 - Undertake follow up home visits (Merseyside Fire and Rescue Service) to older people identified by the campaign team at the events and provide equipment which may help them keep safe and warm, e.g. oil filled radiators;
 - Organise a follow up event to identify positive outcomes of the project to be fed back to the Constituency Committee.

6.3 Members of the Committee will be regularly updated on the project as it develops.

7.0 RISKS

7.1 A detailed risk assessment has been developed to support the constituency working approach.

8.0 OTHER OPTIONS CONSIDERED

8.1 This report sets out activities undertaken in relation to actions agreed by the Committee, all of which have been progressed with due consideration to a range of options.

9.0 CONSULTATION

9.1 Consultation is undertaken with the members of the Constituency Committee as to the development and operation of the Committee. Ongoing consultation with the local community as to issues for the area is an ongoing focus of the constituency working approach.

10.0 IMPLICATIONS FOR VOLUNTARY, COMMUNITY AND FAITH GROUPS

10.1 The constituency working approach has positive implications for voluntary, community and faith groups in Wirral West.

11.0 RESOURCE IMPLICATIONS: FINANCIAL; IT; STAFFING; AND ASSETS

11.1 The activities set out in this report will be delivered via existing resources and utilising the constituency budget as determined by the Committee.
