Licence representations made by Trading Standards follow a protocol agreed between the local authority and Merseyside Police and considered by Wirral's Environment Overview and Scrutiny Committee on the 28th January 2009. A copy of the protocol is attached at 1.

There has been one sale of alcohol from the premises to a 14 year old volunteer.

On 15th April 2009 a sale of a 700ml bottle of WKD Iron Brew was made to an underage volunteer acting on the instructions of Trading Standards. The volunteer had to specifically ask for the alcohol, which is stored behind the till. The volunteer was not asked for any identification nor asked their age. The seller, Mr Bennett, was interviewed following the sale and it transpired that he is the Designated Premises Supervisor and is the Premises Licence Holder.

The store does not operate a refusals log nor is there any training in place. Mr Bennett has failed to produce any due diligence as a means of proving his statutory defence. There do not appear to be any posters relating to a Think 21 or 25 policy.

The 14 year old volunteer was used for test purchasing alcohol for three days during the Easter school holidays. A total of nineteen premises were tested across the Wirral and only one sale, at J&P Off Licence, was made to the volunteer. On the day of the sale two other premises were tested and they both asked the volunteer for identification and subsequently refused to serve alcohol. A copy of the interview with Mr Bennett is attached at 2.

Mr Bennett has been reported for prosecution for a breach of section 146 of the Licensing Act 2003.

SEEKING A LICENCE REVIEW WHILST OFFENCES ARE BEING INVESTIGATED

The following advice is available at page 85 of the guidance issued by the DCMS under section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003 (attached at 3)

11.24 As explained above, it is not the role of a licensing authority to determine the guilt or innocence of individuals charged with licensing or other offences committed on licensed premises. There is therefore no reason why representations giving rise to a review of a premises licence need be delayed pending the outcome of any criminal proceedings. As stated above, at the conclusion of a review, it will be for the licensing authority to determine on the basis of the application for the review and any relevant representations made, what action needs to be taken for the promotion of the licensing objectives in respect of the licence in question, regardless of any subsequent judgment in the courts about the behaviour of individuals

LICENSING OBJECTIVE - THE PROTECTION OF CHILDREN FROM HARM

The purpose of prohibiting the sale of alcohol to under 18s is to protect young people from harm and to protect the wider community from anti-social behaviour.

The DCMS guidance (attached at 4) states;

11.25 There is **certain criminal activity** that may arise in connection with licensed premises, which the Secretary of State considers should be treated particularly seriously. These are the use of the licensed premises:

for the purchase and consumption of alcohol by minors which impacts on the health, educational attainment, employment prospects and propensity for crime of young people

Harm to young people

In 2007 Trading Standards Northwest, an umbrella organisation for Trading Standards authorities, commissioned research into the alcohol purchasing and drinking habits of 15 and 16 year olds. In total 11,724 questionnaires were returned and the following results were noted;

29% who drank alcohol admitted to having been violent whilst drunk - this figure rose to 32% amongst young males.

15% claimed to have been in a car with a young person who had been drinking.

12% stated that they had regretted having sex after drinking alcohol

EXERCISE OF DUE DILIGENCE WITHIN THE PREMISES

The store does not operate a refusals log nor is there any training in place for any other members of staff. Mr Bennett has failed to produce any due diligence as a means of proving his statutory defence. There do not appear to be any posters relating to a Think 25 policy.

A suspension of the licence for a short period of time may be a justified action until such time as staff undergo sufficient training.

PROPOSED LICENCE CONDITIONS

In view of these gaps in good practice Trading Standards ask that the following conditions be attached to the licence:

- 1 The Premises adopt a Think 25 policy and display of the appropriate posters.
- 2 The Premises only accept a passport, a photo driving licence or PASS

SCHEDULE 1

REGULATION OF THE SALE OF ALCOHOL TO PERSONS UNDER 18

INTRODUCTION

The Department of Culture, Media and Sports have issued guidance concerning the application of licensing procedures. In relation to the licensing objective for the protection of children from harm this guidance states:

There is certain criminal activity that may arise in connection with licensed premises, which the Secretary of State considers should be treated particularly seriously. These are the use of the licensed premises: for the purchase and consumption of alcohol by minors, which impacts on the health, educational attainment, employment prospects and propensity for crime of young people.

(Paragraph 11.25 Guidance issued under section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003 by The Department of Culture, Media and Sports)

In view of the importance of this stated public policy objective the following indicates the framework for the regulation of the sale of alcohol to minors.

CRIMINAL PROCEEDINGS - AN OFFENCE UNDER SECTION 146 OF THE LICENSING ACT 2003

Decisions to prosecute for offences of selling alcohol to under 18s will be taken in accordance with Wirral's enforcement policy. (Currently under review). A decision to issue a penalty notice for disorder will be taken on a case by case basis.

All our decisions will have regard to current statutory guidance and codes of practice, particularly the Regulators' Compliance Code, the Code for Crown Prosecutors and the Human Rights Act.

Test purchasing activity will follow guidance issued by LACORS.

(A practical guide for those organisations involved in the conduct of test purchasing operations involving young people and the sale of age-restricted products Date of issue: April 2006)

APPLICATION FOR A REVIEW OF A PREMISES LICENCE - ESCALATION PROCESS

The purpose of the Licence review escalation process is to provide an internal framework to ensure that licence reviews are sought in a proportionate and consistent manner.

The function of the licensing authority is not only remedial but where, crime is involved, wider considerations come into play, including the prevention of crime, and, if not punishment, at least deterrence.

REVIEWS ARISING IN CONNECTION WITH CRIME

- 11.22 A number of reviews may arise in connection with crime that is not directly connected with licensable activities. For example, reviews may arise because of drugs problems at the premises or money laundering by criminal gangs or the sale of contraband or stolen goods there or the sale of firearms. Licensing authorities do not have the power to judge the criminality or otherwise of any issue. This is a matter for the courts of law. The role of the licensing authority when determining such a review is not therefore to establish the guilt or innocence of any individual but to ensure that the crime prevention objective is promoted. Reviews are part of the regulatory process introduced by the 2003 Act and they are not part of criminal law and procedure. Some reviews will arise after the conviction in the criminal courts of certain individuals but not all. In any case, it is for the licensing authority to determine whether the problems associated with the alleged crimes are taking place on the premises and affecting the promotion of the licensing objectives. Where a review follows a conviction, it would also not be for the licensing authority to attempt to go behind any finding of the courts, which should be treated as a matter of undisputed evidence before them.
- 11.23 Where the licensing authority is conducting a review on the ground that the premises have been used for criminal purposes, its role is solely to determine what steps should be taken in connection with the premises licence, for the promotion of the crime prevention objective. It is important to recognise that certain criminal activity or associated problems may be taking place or have taken

place despite the best efforts of the licensee and the staff working at the premises and despite full compliance with the conditions attached to the licence. In such circumstances, the licensing authority is still empowered to take any necessary steps to remedy the problems. The licensing authority's duty is to take steps with a view to the promotion of the licensing objectives in the interests of the wider community and not those of the individual holder of the premises licence.

- 11.24 As explained above, it is not the role of a licensing authority to determine the guilt or innocence of individuals charged with licensing or other offences committed on licensed premises. There is therefore no reason why representations giving rise to a review of a premises licence need be delayed pending the outcome of any criminal proceedings. As stated above, at the conclusion of a review, it will be for the licensing authority to determine on the basis of the application for the review and any relevant representations made, what action needs to be taken for the promotion of the licensing objectives in respect of the licence in question, regardless of any subsequent judgment in the courts about the behaviour of individuals.
- 11.25 There is certain criminal activity that may arise in connection with licensed premises, which the Secretary of State considers should be treated particularly seriously. These are the use of the licensed premises:
 - for the sale and distribution of Class A drugs and the laundering of the proceeds of drugs crime;
 - for the sale and distribution of illegal firearms;
 - for the evasion of copyright in respect of pirated or unlicensed films and music, which does considerable damage to the industries affected;





- for the purchase and consumption of alcohol by minors which impacts on the health, educational attainment, employment prospects and propensity for crime of young people;
- for prostitution or the sale of unlawful pornography;
- by organised groups of paedophiles to groom children;
 - as the base for the organisation of criminal activity, particularly by gangs;
 - for the organisation of racist activity or the promotion of racist attacks;
 - for unlawful gaming and gambling; and
 - for the sale of smuggled tobacco and alcohol.
- 11.26 It is envisaged that licensing authorities, the police and other law enforcement agencies, which are responsible authorities, will use the review procedures effectively to deter such activities and crime. Where reviews arise and the licensing authority determines that the crime prevention objective is being undermined through the premises being used to further crimes, it is expected that revocation of the licence even in the first instance should be seriously considered. We would also encourage liaison with the local Crime and Disorder Reduction Partnership.
- 11.27 It should be noted that it is unlawful to discriminate or to refuse service on grounds of race or by displaying racially discriminatory signs on the premises. Representations made about such activity from responsible authorities or interested parties would be relevant to the promotion of the crime prevention objective and justifiably give rise to a review.

REVIEW OF A PREMISES LICENCE FOLLOWING CLOSURE ORDER

- 11.28 Licensing authorities are subject to certain timescales, set out in the legislation, for the review of a premises licence following a closure order. The relevant time periods run concurrently and are as follows:
 - when the licensing authority receives notice that a magistrates' court has made a closure order it has 28 days to determine the licence review: The determination must be made before the expiry of the 28th day after the day on which the notice is received;
 - the hearing must be held within 10 working days, the first of which is the day after the day the notice from the magistrates' court is received;
 - notice of the hearing must be given no later than 5 working days before the first hearing day. There must be five clear working days between the giving of the notice and the start of the hearing.

Mandatory conditions where licence authorises supply of alcohol

- (1) Where a premises licence authorises the supply of alcohol, the licence must include the following conditions.
- (1) The first condition is that no supply of alcohol may be made under the premises licence-
 - a) at a time when there is no designated premises supervisor in respect of the premises licence, or
 - at a time when the designated premises supervisor does not hold a personal licence or his personal licence is suspended.
- (2) The second condition is that every supply of alcohol under the premises licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence.
