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## **SUMMARY OF PROGRESS**

- Three consecutive OFSTED monitoring visits concluded progress is being made
- Quality of social work is increasingly effective and is making a difference
- Thresholds are better understood and are increasingly embedded
- Timely responses to concerns about children are being made
- Assessments of need are appropriate and the right services are being provided
- Plans for children are in place and are meeting need
- No child tracked or sampled has been found to be at risk and all had their safeguarding needs met
- Improved quality of services for care leavers
- Referral rates inline with comparator authorities
- Staff overwhelmingly positive about progress and the vision for children in Wirral
- Newly qualified staff positive about the support they receive
- All senior roles recruited to on a permanent basis



## **SUMMARY OF PROGRESS**

- Recruitment of a permanent social work workforce remains a challenge
- The number of looked after children has plateaued but remains too high
- Some Police and Health service practice is non-compliant with statutory requirements
- Performance management has improved but is not yet fully embedded across all teams
- The quality of supervision is variable and is not consistently reflective
- Levels of sickness absence in some areas are too high
- More work is needed to ensure a consistent focus on the customer
- Monitoring visit on 12 & 13 December
- There are less than 100 days left!



#### PERFORMANCE HEADLINES

- **Number of contacts** continue to fall each month reducing from 2147 contacts in May to 1521 in September a 29% decrease.
- Number of referrals have fallen reducing from 431 in June to 359 in September.
- **Number of assessments completed** increased from 430 in June to 476 in September.
- Timeliness of assessments improved 86% of assessments now completed in the agreed timescale. An increase from 74% in April.
- Number of children who are subject to a child protection plan continues to increase from 265 in April to 444 in September a 67.5% increase
- % of ICPC taking place in the month and within timescales has increased in May
   74.6% were completed on time compared to 87.5% in September.
- Number of children who are looked after continues to plateau at 843 in September.
- Number of children missing episodes 159 episodes in May to 135 episodes in September a reduction of 15%.



## **ALL AGE DISABILTY SERVICE**

- More work is needed to ensure consistency of practice against the requirement to be good working with CWP and Head of Practice Improvement
- The quality of supervision needs to improve so that it is reflective and results in improved practice in every case
- The high cost of support packages including the high cost of specialist school/college placements especially when transferring to adult is the challenge remains challenging.
- Demand management strategy needs to be developed and implemented
- A fundamental review of Short Breaks is about to begin
- Recruitment of experienced social workers is improving but remains a challenge
- Engagement from and with partners in supporting children and families that don't need and do need a social care service needs strengthening
- Continue to explore collaborative working with SEND
