Homelessness means different things to different people – it has many forms and can often be hidden:-





Causes of Homelessness

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Homelessness rarely has a single cause or explanation and can include multiple underlying problems:-

A number of households present with multiple support needs and are 'complex' – these are the ones which require intensive support and intervention





Homeless Reduction Act (HRA) 2017



New Act significantly extends homelessness services and duties and ensures that a greater number of people can make a homeless application

Five key changes :-

- 1. Improved advice and information to prevention of homelessness Government wanted it to be more effective and wider advice to be given
- 2. Extension of the period of time to those considered threatened with homelessness from 28 to 56 days

Extension aims to encourage LAs to act quicker and more time to spend preventing homelessness



Homeless Reduction Act (HRA) 2017

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- 3. New statutory duties to prevent and relieve homelessness for all eligible people (regardless of priority need and intentionality)
 - previously advice fell outside the statutory framework so single homeless people considered to receive limited information

 Relief duties now include provision of interim accommodation (homeless and in priority need cases)
- 4. Introducing assessments and Personalised Housing Plans

 circumstances and any support needs to keep accommodation

 PHPs to set out the actions LA and individuals will take to resolve their situation
- 5. New 'Duty to Refer' placed on public bodies to work together to prevent and relieve homelessness
 - duty for agencies to refer to Housing Options Team anyone they suspect to be threat of homeless within 56 days



Responses to Homelessness

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- The Council commits £3.9m annually to both meet its statutory obligations and respond to homelessness and has secured specific one off grants totalling £888k
- Housing Options Services 24/7, 365 days a year offering specialist advice and support
- Range of prevention tools including financial
- 388 units of commissioned supported housing services of which
 - 142 Direct access hostel accommodation (including refuge for Domestic Abuse)
 - 159 Supported housing with 24/7 staffing
 - 64 Semi independent/dispersed accommodation
 - 23 Supported Lodgings
- Up to 155 people supported through floating support services (one specific to mental health)
- Intensive outreach services (complex cases) rough sleepers/entrenched and/or at threat of disengaging with services or not accessing at all



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- Dedicated web page to support public bodies with 'duty to refer'
- Increased TA offer offer temporary accommodation to relief cases
- Partnership working CAB and DWP Community officer (offers debt, budget and employment advice, ensure sanctions not issued if under assessment)
- Part of both the Multi-Agency Risk Assessment Conference (MARAC) and Multi-Agency
 Public Protection Arrangements (MAPPA) Panels contributing to rehousing solutions
 and options for vulnerable people and serious offenders
- Strategic links to other services
 - Private Sector Landlords, Accreditation, Licensing i.e. link empty property work grants to nominations,
 - CYPD protocols for joint assessments and emergency placements for 16/17 year olds
 - Care Leavers Accommodation Options/solutions for 16 + and move on 18+



Next Steps

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- Homelessness Review by end 2019 inform priorities and the Wirral's next Homelessness Strategy up to 2024 & shape future commissioning requirements for Homelessness Services.
- Combined Authority/LCR Partnerships
 - Trailblazer funding secured £214,518 for 3 posts for 2 years
 - Specialist Debt Advisor to address affordability issue/Budgeting
 - Private Sector Liaison Officer Enhance access to Private Tenancies
 - Early Intervention / Prevention "Homeless Champion "
 - Sub-regional Assertive Outreach Service specifically in relation to the delivery of the 'Housing First' model which will shortly be rolled out across the region.
- Successfully secured Rough Sleeper Initiative funding Complex Needs/Assertive Outreach Workers to be linked to the Night Shelter – commence end July
- 25% Contact lost Cases Negative or Positive ? more understanding of why
- Work with RP's on potential for Shared Tenancies/Reconfiguration of existing stock
