# REPORT OF THE DIRECTOR OF ADULT SOCIAL SERVICES

## TENDER FOR AN INDEPENDENT MENTAL CAPACITY ADVOCATE SERVICE

## Executive Summary

The Mental Capacity Act 2005 (MCA) requires Councils to commission an Independent Mental Capacity Advocate (IMCA) service. This involves a key decision that was first identified in the Forward Plan dated 1<sup>st</sup> July 2007. It is proposed that Wirral now tenders for the IMCA service.

#### 1 Background

- 1.1 The MCA sets out a framework for decision making for people who lack mental capacity to do so for themselves.
- 1.2 As part of this, where a mentally incapacitated person has no relative or other person who can be consulted, a referral to an IMCA is required for certain key decisions:
  - Serious medical treatment
  - Long term admission to hospital or residential accommodation
  - Residential care reviews
  - Adult protection plans
- 1.3 The MCA requires the Council to commission an IMCA service on behalf of the health and social care services in its area.
- 1.4 This is to be overseen by a Local Implementation Network representing stakeholders in the wider health and social care economy.

## 2 Report

- 2.1 DH guidance was expected that would impact on the tender process, however, this was not published in time to be included in a tender for the required implementation date of 1<sup>st</sup> April 2007.
- 2.2 An interim service was implemented by amendment to an existing service level agreement with a voluntary sector advocacy service.
- 2.3 The DH has released guidance on the service specifications and tender requirements for the IMCA service. These will form the basis of the tender specifications.

2.4 It is proposed to tender for a 3 year service level agreement in line with Departmental policy.

## 3 Financial Implications

Wirral has been allocated a grant of £50,928 pa by the Department of Health to commission the IMCA service. It is proposed to tender within the grant limits.
