#### 1.0 EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 This report seeks a decision by Wallasey Constituency Committee as to bid YW2 to Your Wirral (Wallasey) by Striding Out CIC for a Digital & IT Skills for Employability Project.

#### 2.0 BACKGROUND

- 2.1 At Wallasey Constituency Committee Working Group on 1 October 2014 a decision was made to award Your Wirral (Wallasey) grants amounting to a total of £61,733.42 to social sector groups (minute 20 of the Working Group refers). A decision in relation to bid number YW2 (Digital & IT Skills for Employability) for £2,485 was deferred for further information, namely whether there was a gap in provision that this project would fill.
- 2.2 The Your Wirral (Wallasey) Fund was overspent by £11,733.42 and at Wallasey Constituency Committee on 23 October 2014, the Constituency Manager identified alternative funding to allocate to this overspend (minute 20 of the Committee refers). The Constituency Manager also provided additional information in relation to bid YW2 by Striding Out CIC, proposed to be delivered from Vale House Community Centre, New Brighton. The Constituency Manager reported that the Council's Lifelong Learning Team had recently commissioned Striding Out CIC to deliver a project to 160 learners also from Vale House Community Centre. The Team was satisfied that this would provide adequate coverage from this geographical location. The Committee requested further information regarding the bid, in particular where there were any overlaps/duplication with the project currently funded, and asked that the applicant attend the next Committee meeting to answer any further questions

that the Committee may have. The details of bid YW2 are set out in Appendix 1.

- Appendix 2 sets out an extract from Striding Out CIC's bid document to the Council's Lifelong Learning Team which outlines the contents of the courses currently funded. Striding Out CIC has been commissioned to provide courses (as outlined in Appendix 2) for 160 learners before July 2015. In December 2014 the contract was reviewed and at that time only 5 learners had been recruited. The Team is satisfied that Striding Out CIC has advertised the courses well but that there does not appear to be sufficient demand in the area.
- 2.4 The Committee is requested to make a decision as to whether this bid YW2 submitted to Your Wirral is funded.

# 3.0 <u>Budget 2014/15</u>

- At Wallasey Constituency Committee on 23 October 2014, decisions were made as to its uncommitted budget of £46,306.73, which included £5,950 set aside for its Problem Solving Fund (minute 20 of the Committee refers). £24,780 was committed to various projects to tackle the Constituency's priorities. In addition, a maximum of £20,000 was set aside for the erection of Christmas lights in key locations across the Constituency allowing for any contingencies. This left £1,526.73 allocated to the Problem Solving Fund.
- A total of £16,237.96 was spent on Christmas lighting. The remaining £3,762.04 has therefore been returned to the Problem Solving Fund, leaving a total of £5,288.77 unspent by the Committee and set aside in its Problem Solving Fund.
- 3.3 If the Committee wishes to fund YW2 it will do so from this Problem Solving Fund.
- A full update on the 2014/15 budget spend will be provided to the Constituency Committee at its meeting on 16 April 2015. This will include an evaluation of projects in receipt of Wallasey Bright Ideas Fund (Year 1). The funding available to the Committee for 2015/16 is not yet known.

## 4.0 RELEVANT RISKS

4.1 Failure to agree the distribution of funding may result in a loss of funding allocation.

## 5.0 OTHER OPTIONS CONSIDERED

5.1 Learning has been taken from the approach to this spend in 2013/14.

# 6.0 CONSULTATION

6.1 Elected members and community representatives have the opportunity to participate in all Constituency Committees and Working Group meetings.

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# Extract from bid by Striding Out CIC to the Council's Lifelong Learning Team

Striding Out CIC would deliver 10 cohorts of learners divided into 5 cohorts across 2 customised courses, each course made up of 20 guided learning hours.

Course 1 - Figuring Out

Course 2 - Your Next Step

We would seek to recruit 20 learners per course, giving the maximum total of 400 learners.

Repeat learners could equal 200 if every learner on course 1 returned for course 2.

We would plan to run;

5 x Course 1 - Figuring Out

5 x Course 2 - Your Next Step

The venue will be based within Vale House community centre, New Brighton, which is open 7 days a week and frequented by thousands of local community residents and visitors throughout the year so the recruitment, out reach and engagement of the new learners will be made easier.

The benefits of the Figuring Out course for the Learners include -

Increase their confidence

Clarify their life and career goals

Enhance their interpersonal and interview skills

Design an Action plan for their future success

Learn how to access supportive materials, contacts and resources

Experience the positive feedback of peers, tutors (and eventually employers)

Encourage a personal engagement with Lifelong Learning.

The benefits of the Your Nxt Step course are that the Learners will -

Be prepared and ready for Employment

Develop new interpersonal skills

Clarify life and career goals

Enhance their CV

Improve their communication skills

Develop greater self-confidence

Learners will achieve a greater sense of connectedness with those around them as they discover more fully the untapped resources they already have, together with the new skills offered by each course. Self-esteem is built, and encouraged together with confidence helps top lessen the cohort's sense of disadvantage, marginalization or isolation. The courses aim to help the vulnerable and the disabled to feel more empowered. Adults with low level skills will be helped to discover that learning can be fun – and lifelong.

The impact on the lives of Learners attending these courses is usually measurable and obvious. They rightly feel understood, valued, included and supported and they are better able to participate in their communities and find meaningful work.

Part of our philosophy is that we don't teach subjects, we teach Learners, and the focus that we give to their needs has obvious positive implications for the whole person which impacts their ability to function well in their relationships, their families, their workplaces, their social networks, etc.
