14 **MINUTES**

RESOLVED:

That the minutes of the meeting held on 28 May 2015 be agreed as a correct record.

15 **ANTI-SOCIAL BEHAVIOUR BUDGET**

The Chair reported that two bids had been received from Birkenhead Youth Club and Wirral Tennis Centre in relation to the delivery of anti-social behaviour (ASB) activities, it was suggested and agreed that the bids be referred to the ASB Task and Finish Group for further consideration.

The Chair indicated that the Committee had previously received an update on data and action plan in relation to anti-social behaviour (ASB) from Mr Tony Kinsella, Independent Consultant who had been commissioned to undertake analysis in relation to ASB allocation. The Chair asked Members how they wished the funding to be spent and reiterated that at the last meeting it was agreed that funding would be given only to those services that added value in tackling ASB in Birkenhead.

In response to the Chair, a Member indicated in relation to ASB in Shaw Street, a new CCTV system had been installed and fencing had been erected to stop the thorough-through to Borough Road, he felt that the problems on Shaw Street had now been resolved but suggested that this be monitored on a regular basis to ensure no reoccurrence.

A Member raised concern regarding the CCTV system installed at Rock Ferry as it did not seem to be appropriately monitored and there had been recent incidents that had not been captured. She further indicated that the CCTV system in Birkenhead Park was not working, this had been reported and officers would be investigating, she further reported that she would like to see additional CCTV installed in the park due to recent incidents.

In response, Members indicated that CCTV was monitored by both Merseyside Police in Borough Road and Liverpool. The Chair asked the Constituency Manager to ascertain where the CCTV images were monitored; were they monitored 24 hours a day; what proportion of cameras were working and report back to the ASB Task and Finish Group.

A Member raised concern regarding a recent burglary that had occurred at Prenton Primary School; the school had asked if its CCTV system could be included in the monitoring scheme. In response it was reported that if the school was a member of the Community Patrol it would be automatically

monitored as part of the scheme. The Chair asked the Constituency Manager to ascertain information as to which schools had CCTV cameras and had opted into the community patrol service and at what cost and also investigate whether Prenton Primary could be linked up to a monitoring network and report back to the ASB Task and Finish Group.

In relation to CCTV, the Constituency Manager indicated that she had invited Ian Lowrie, Mark Cambourne, Steve Preston and Keith Patterson to the next meeting of the ASB task and Finish Group for a progress update as to how the monitoring system was working.

The Chair asked the Members of the ASB Task and Finish Group to provide a report as to how they feel the ASB budget should be spent and for those recommendations to be submitted to the next meeting of the Committee for further discussion.

The Chair further asked the Constituency Manager to report to the Task and Finish Group on the recent trends in ASB at McDonalds, ASDA and Birkenhead Park and liaise with McDonald's and Asda as to whether they would be willing to contribute to funding a Community Support Officer and ascertaining their views on how they feel the money should be spent on tackling ASB in those particular areas and feed back to ASB Task and Finish Group. He also asked that she liaise with Councillor George Davies on his suggestions on how the ASB budget could be spent in Birkenhead Park and feedback to the ASB Task and Finish Group.

RESOLVED: That

(1) the Constituency Manager be requested to report back to the ASB Task and Finish Group at its next meeting on the following issues raised by the Committee;

- **Recent trends in ASB at McDonald's, Asda and Birkenhead Park**
- **Suggestions gathered from McDonald's and Asda as to how the ASB budget might be most effectively spent in the town centre, and whether they may contribute funding for a Community Support Officer**
- **Suggestions from Councillor G Davies in relation to ASB Budget spend in Birkenhead Park**
- **Birkenhead's CCTV images – monitoring and proportion of cameras working**
- **Schools which had opted into the Community Patrol service, and at what cost**

- (2) **the Constituency Manager be requested to invite representatives from Community Patrol be to a future meeting of the ASB Task and Finish Group; and**
- (3) **be requested to investigate as to whether Prenton Primary could be linked up to CCTV monitoring network and the query raised by constituent in relation a telephone pole;and**
- (4) **the ASB Task and Finish Group be requested to provide a report as to how they feel the ASB budget should be spent and for those recommendations to be submitted to the next meeting of the Committee for further discussion.**

16 **KEEP BIRKENHEAD CLEAN BUDGET**

In response to the Chair, the Constituency Manager indicated that 20k had been allocated from the Committee's Budget for 'Improving the Environment' or 'Grotspot1' projects this was to develop a service to improve sites in Birkenhead that had been left open, poorly maintained and disused, therefore looking unsightly in the area, often attracting litter and fly tipping.

Lairdside Communities Together (LCT) won the contract for one year, which ends in December 2015, to clean up a number of 'grotspot' areas around the Birkenhead constituency. Locations for clean ups had been identified by Local Councillors and had been prioritised by LCT following a site visit. LCT was undertaking clearance and would be engaging with nearby residents to complete satisfaction surveys.

Representatives of LCT were present at the meeting and provided an update report (also attached as Appendix 3 to the Constituency Managers report). They highlighted the clearances that had been completed so far and indicated that they had worked with site owners to put in place preventative measures to avoid problems recurring in the future.

In relation to the clearing of privately owned properties, it was reported that locating and identifying the responsible landlords had proved problematic and explained that landlords reserved the right not to engage with their officers. In relation to the billing of sites cleared, officers were working to try and engage landowners to resolve this issue and collect payment.

In response to the Chair, the Legal Advisor to the Committee indicated that it was difficult for officers to identify unregistered landowners, however, for those that were identified the Council can serve notice on land that is considered to be detrimental to the amenity of the area. If notice is not complied with the Council can enter the land and undertake works in default

and a charge can then be entered on the local land charges register against that property. The Council also has the right to prosecute those who failed to comply with the notice. A Member, in response, asked what percentage of the Biffa contract was given to prosecute landowners for their failure to act.

In relation to Bonfire night, the Chair asked the Constituency Manager to contact Magenta regarding possible issues on the Noctorum estate linking with the Lairdside Community Trust contract.

Councillor D Roberts and the Constituency Manager agreed to liaise with the Merseyside Fire and Rescue Authority to clear skips prior to Bonfire Night and on any potential joint activities utilising the skip funding.

In relation to the 'In Bloom' project, the Environmental Task and Finish Group be requested to develop the project and evaluate the Lairdside Community Trust contract.

The Chair requested Ward Councillors to meet and identify their worst 'grot spots' and urged them to utilise the skip project.

Members in response, to a letter sent to the Chair from the Chief Executive requested that the Constituency Manager contact the Council's Environmental Team to ask them again to provide data breaking down spend for the constituency area regarding the Biffa contract. The Chair asked that this letter be shared with the Environmental Task and Finish Group.

RESOLVED: That

- (1) the progress made by the LCT 'grotspot' project as reported in the Constituency Managers report be noted;**
- (2) the Constituency Manager be requested to:**
 - along with Councillor D Roberts, liaise with Merseyside Fire Authority on clearing of skips before Bonfire Night and on any possible joint activities using skip funding**
 - contact the Council's Environmental Team requesting data breaking down spend for constituency area for the Biffa contract**
 - contact Magenta regarding possible issues on Noctorum estate for Bonfire Night and link with the Lairdside Community Trust contract**

- (3) the Environmental Task and Finish Group be requested at its next meeting develop the 'In Bloom' project and evaluate the Lairdside Community Trust contract.**

17 **FEEDING BIRKENHEAD**

The Birkenhead Constituency Engagement Officer and an officer from the office of The Rt Hon Frank Field MP gave a verbal update regarding the Feeding Birkenhead Project.

Mr Brannan indicated that seven projects were currently running and it was intended that these projects would carry on through the October half term.

The Chair indicated that he had written to four schools which had a high proportion of children receiving free school meals to ask if they would be willing to open up their schools during the half term, to date none of the schools had replied. The Chair reported that he, the Deputy Chair and Leader of the Council would continue to chase up the schools for support.

The Chair introduced Ms Emma Wilkes to the Committee who updated Members on their SEAD project.

SEAD project was a Neo Community Café's Empowerment and Social Action programme which offered communities the tools and knowledge to build self-sustainable long-term solutions to the issues of food poverty. It was hoped that the project would be replicated in Birkenhead and Rock Ferry.

In relation to activities Ms Wilkes indicated that week days there would be activities such as Community Café – 3 days per week, 0-5 early years provision supported by the Shaw Trust, baby and tots groups, baby massage, surplus food project in conjunction with local shops and free family law weekly advice sessions.

Ms Wilkes indicated that she had regular meeting with the community to discuss what activities they would like to see delivered.

The Chair updated the Committee on the Task and Finish Groups that had been established in each Ward consisting of Ward Councillors, himself and Andrew Forsey would work to secure a community venue for a daily 'food hub'. The first of these Task and Groups would be held in Rock Ferry and its first objective would be to secure the future of the Vikings Centre and discuss a bid received from the Neo Café who wished to operate there.

In response to Ms Wilkes request for the Committee to ask retailers and food outlets to support their projects, the Chair reported that the Committee would write to each of the supermarkets in Birkenhead asking them to pledge their

support to feeding Birkenhead by rescuing their surplus food and donating surplus chillers and freezers to each 'food hub'.

In response to a suggestion that chillers could be provided outside in the community giving people better access to food; this had been evidenced in a similar scheme in Spain. The Chair requested that the Constituency Manager and Mr Andrew Forsey explore this suggestion to see if this could be replicated in Birkenhead.

RESOLVED: That

- (1) the update be noted;**
- (2) Task and Finish Groups that had been established in each Ward consisting of Ward Councillors, himself and Andrew Forsey would work to secure a community venue for a daily 'food hub'. The first of these Task and Groups would be held in Rock Ferry and its first objective would be to secure the future of the Vikings Centre and discuss a bid received from the Neo Café who wished to operate there.**

18 PRESENTATION - HOMESTART - 'BREAST FEEDING PROJECT'

The Committee received an update from Ms Bev Morgan, Home-Start Wirral regarding the Breastfeeding Peer Support, Antenatal Pilot Birkenhead District.

Ms Morgan gave a presentation indicating that the service was funded to pilot provision of additional support in the Birkenhead area during pregnancy to increase initiation rates, enable better health outcomes and reduce the impact of social inequality.

The presentation outlined the outputs and outcomes achieved; progress to date; ongoing support mechanisms; text buddy service; barriers to referrals and overcoming these barriers; creation of a breastfeeding community; progress from 1 February – September 2015; percentage of babies breastfeeding at 6-8 weeks 2014/15 by Wirral Wards; overcoming cultural barriers and feedback received.

RESOLVED:

That Ms Morgan be thanked for her update presentation.

19 **CROSSWAYS**

The Chair indicated that a residents meeting had been held and was progressing well.

20 **PUBLIC QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS**

The Chair invited the following members of the public to ask their questions.

Question 1 Margaret Wycherley

Ms Wycherley was not present at the meeting but had raised concerns regarding ex-offenders selling door to door and asked if the Committee could help.

Ms Wycherley had received a written response from Merseyside Probation Services.

A member of the public asked if Birkenhead could apply to become a “no cold calling” zone, the Constituency Manager agreed to pursue this with Trading Standards Department.

Question 3 W Knapton

W Knapton was not present at the meeting but had asked about the telephone pole which had been lying in the alleyway behind CH42 6PH since February, despite being reported several times, also could the bags of rubbish that have had warning notices on them for four weeks be cleared away from the alley gates adjacent.

W Knapton had received a response from the Technical Services Department. In response, the Chair requested that the Environmental Task and Finish Group be asked to look at the issues raised on behalf of W Knapton.

Question 4 John Brace

Mr Brace asked two questions, one in relation to an update on the Youth Zone “the Hive” and a second regarding the payroll taxes paid by Members.

Mr Brace had received a response from the Children and Young People’s Department and the Merseyside Fire and Rescue Service.

Question 5 Frances Greenwood

Ms Greenwood who was not present at the meeting but asked about the utilisation of those serving Community Service and queried if there was a joint initiative with the Council and Probation Service.

Ms Greenwood had received a response from the Probation Service.

The Chair indicated that having read the response received by the Probation Service he had been impressed by the contributions made by Community Service and requested that on behalf of the Committee the Constituency Manager be asked to write to the Probation Services thanking them for the work they had undertaken and liaise with Ms Greenwood to identify further areas Community Payback could do.

Question 7 Bob Giles

Mr Giles asked three questions regarding the Council's contribution to food banks; control measures with regard to charity collectors known as "chuggers" and plans to install a drinking water fountain at the Central Library.

Mr Giles had received responses from the appropriate officers/departments.

The Legal Advisor indicated that in relation to the issue of charity collectors he would liaise with the Council's Licensing Manager and provide Mr Giles with a detailed response.

Question 8 Susanne McLoughlin

Ms McLoughlin asked the Committee if they would consider supporting a request to Merseytravel proposing a train station from Prenton to Liverpool.

Ms McLaughlin had received a response from Merseytravel.

On behalf of the Committee, the Chair asked Councillor A Davies to write to the Chair of Merseytravel to enquire about a new station in Prenton and request information on the distribution of expenditure from the investment budget i.e. how it was split between Wirral and other local authorities.

21 **ST PAULS COMMUNITY HUB**

The Constituency Manager updated that Committee on the planned action for St Pauls Community Hub which include development of the outdoor garden into a creative learning space and an increase in the speech and language provision.

The Action Plan was attached as an appendix to the Constituency Managers update report.

22 **TRANMERE COMMUNITY PROJECT**

The Committee received a verbal update from Ms Lynne Cullens from the Tranmere Community Project.

Ms Cullens reported that the first of the seven planned schemes had been held and had proved very successful; Ms Cullens was now looking to secure the future for the remaining projects.

The Chair congratulated Ms Cullens on an excellent project indicating that the scheme whilst was fun during the holidays for the children it also ensured that the children were fed.

1.0 EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 Section 2.0 of this report provides an update on progress in relation to agreed schemes of work from the budget devolved to the Constituency Committee to date. A finance summary sheet for Constituency Committee budget and expenditure can be found in Appendix 1.

2.0 UPDATE ON BUDGET FOR BIRKENHEAD CONSTITUENCY COMMITTEE

2.1 Tackling ASB

This 2015-16 the Constituency Committee had in total £54,000 to allocate to ASB projects. Details of this 2015-16 allocations are set out in the finance summary sheet in Appendix 1.

- £3,779 YMCA to deliver their Summer activities
- £7,064 The LADS project which will be delivered by the Youth Services.
- £1700 Boxing project
- £7956 Sports development
- £2000 Youth sports
- £1500 Ridgeway bonfire night

• **Total spent: £23,999**

There is £30,034 remaining for the ASB task group to allocate.

Recommendations:

The Constituency Committee is requested to:

- Note that the ASB task group will meet and allocate the remaining ASB funds

2.2 Keeping Birkenhead Clean

In 2015-16 the constituency committee had £20,000 environmental funds which has been fully allocated as follows:

- £14K Involve North West – Continued Grotspot project
- £6K skip fund

LCT is now called Involved North West. They have continued to deliver the Grotspot project and reactive fly tipping contract. They have completed a series of clean-ups which are highlighted in Appendix 2. They have picked up any fly tipping not under the Biffa contract and the joined up environmental service has become effective with no outstanding issues reported. Involve have also planted up planters in Claughton Village and worked with Bidston Avenue Primary to plant daffodils on Bidston Avenue.

The Royal Horticultural Society co-ordinate an 'North West In Bloom' competition for local neighbourhood groups to enter. Judging takes place in July against a set criteria of: impact of planting, community involvement, using sustainable methods, biodiversity etc. Involve has allocated £1K to each ward for Birkenhead in Bloom for planning schemes and planting from March to July 2016 out of the Grotspot contract.

Wirral Environmental Network has agreed to deliver a hanging basket engagement day in each area. The eco-schools co-ordinator has written to each school in the identified area to deliver engagement afternoons with local schools. The police would like to be involved in engagement days and clean-ups prior to 'In Bloom' judging. Big Local Beechwood has agreed to contribute £3K for Beechwood and Bidston village.

- Police facilitated clean up in the North end – date to be confirmed
- Programme of clean-ups preceding the 'in bloom' judging areas, circa 6 clean-ups in July 2016

The constituency team are in talks with the Probation Service around 'Community Pay Back' delivering a programme of alleyway weed clearing and involving 'Community Pay Back' in the Birkenhead 'In Bloom' for clean ups and watering.

2.3 Feeding Birkenhead

2.3.1 Food hubs

£15,000 has been allocated to Neo Café who is working in partnership with The Viking Centre to deliver a discounted super market, food for children in holidays, hampers, luncheon club, meals for families and the elderly. The Vikes and Neo provide a range of complementary services like information and guidance, youth dinner clubs including hot dinners activities, baby massage, financial and legal advice.

Neo is working with TCP around intergenerational work and their luncheon club. They are also providing top up food bags to the elderly in the area.

Neo is working with Tranmere Rovers, working together to develop more community offers relating food and half term offers around sport and community food.

Neo has worked with Involve North West to deliver the Christmas crisis hampers and Involve now refers and signposts further people in need relating food. Also Neo have supported women's refuge and with clothes and food.

The food hub works in partnership with Fareshare and supermarkets to redistribute surplus foods to people who need it and avoid waste.

Food Hampers over the Christmas period helped approx 423 individuals through giving out 94 hampers as well as other hampers being distributed through the women's refuge which we did not request figures for and through Councillor Billy Davis to families with illness and other crisis.

The youth dinner club and fun with food activities had 547 attendances all accessing freshly cooked food and activities.

The TCP luncheon club has now served 240 hot 3 course reduced price meals to the elderly and given out a further 45 January survival food bags.

These figures do not include social supermarket, information and guidance service, pop up events and other community project support.

The remaining £28,750 of constituency committee funding is recommended to be allocated to a further two hubs in areas of most need in Birkenhead. St James and Beechwood have come forward with proposals around delivering a food hub. The St James proposal can be seen in Appendix 3.

We are working towards providing a food hub in each ward. Oxton, Claughton and Prenton will be priority areas to look to deliver food hub activity from, if funding becomes available to the Constituency Committee, from March 2016-17.

'Help yourself' community fridges

Frank Field MP's Feeding Birkenhead campaign is supporting each Food Hub and other community buildings to offer a fridge containing surplus food supplied by supermarkets for local residents to help themselves.

A range of supermarkets and recycle businesses have been approached to supply chillers. Three Supermarkets are looking to offer chillers to community groups. Environmental Health is supporting the project by providing guidelines and officer support.

Fare Share

The Wirral Fare Share was launched before Christmas and is located in Wallasey Wheatland Road Business units. Fare Share national is bidding to Your Wirral to cover the yearly costs for three community organisations subscriptions. Another application will be completed to cover three further subscriptions.

His Church

A fact finding visit to 'His Church' Sheffield and Community Shop will take place on 20th and 21st January 2016 facilitated by Neo Café.

'His Church' offers food in the same way as Fare Share and is looking to work in partnership with Birkenhead community groups and the Council.

Recommendations:

The Constituency Committee is requested to:

- **Approve St James to develop the food hub for the North end of Birkenhead**
- **Approve that Beechwood Community Association develop the food hub for Beechwood**
- **Note the progress of the Rock Ferry food hub facilitated by Neo Cafe**

2.3.2 Your Wirral Birkenhead

For the final year, Birkenhead Constituency Committee has been allocated £75,000 of Your Wirral funding. The underspend from last year of circa £34,000 has been carried forward as agreed by Magenta Living. For 2015-16 the total allocation for Your Wirral was £109,000. After discussions at the previous meeting, it was agreed that the funding would continue to target child poverty and feeding hungry children in Birkenhead. The Your Wirral funding round took place in July 2015 and is now on-going, 13 projects were funded over the Summer, October and Christmas holidays. There is currently £91,609.00 of Your Wirral funds to allocate.

Recommendations:

2.4 Road Safety

In 2015-16, £25,000 was allocated to road safety problems in Birkenhead. The Road Safety task group met on 11th December and considered 9 road safety proposals. Funds were allocated to the following:

Circular Road – One Way Traffic Regulation Order

Local Councillors reported that there were a number of issues in the area. The most pressing being that Circular Road would be safer as a one-way street. It is comparatively narrow with limited parking spaces for residents' cars. This leaves a narrow roadway for vehicles to pass. There are elderly residents and young children in the immediate area and residents have complained that there are times when ambulances have real difficulty

reaching people in need due to parking. Additionally there is no footway on sections of this road and pedestrians coming out of residences walk straight onto the road.

Officers have assessed the feasibility of providing a one-way restriction along Circular Road and consider there may be scope to impose such a restriction between property boundary no.1&11, Circular Road to property no. 12 Lowwood Road.

Decision

Concerns were raised about poor visibility, coupled with a lack of pavement for pedestrians and problems with vehicles reversing in the area. The project will address these issues and is estimated to cost £7000. It was agreed by the group that this project should be funded.

Hinderton Road - Two Vehicle Activated Signs

Local Councillors reported that Hinderton Road has a very dangerous junction with Holt Hill and there was serious collision there within the last year. Councillors felt that there is a strong case for additional measures at this junction to try and prevent further incidents of this nature.

Decision

After some discussion based on evidence of injury crashes, it was agreed by the Road Safety task group that a project to introduce two vehicle activated signs at £9K should be funded and that it also be encouraged that the community engage with the Council/Police Community Speedwatch initiative.

Bidston Village - Two Vehicle Activated Signs

There are traffic problems around cars speeding through Bidston Village.

Decision

After some discussion based on evidence of injury crashes, it was agreed by the group that a project to introduce two vehicle activated signs at £9K should be funded and that it also be encouraged that the community engage with the Council/Police Community Speedwatch initiative. The road is in a conservation area so further engagement with residents and the conservation group will be needed.

Details of the full nine proposals submitted to the Road Safety task group can be found in Appendix 5. The remaining proposals will be reviewed if the Constituency Committee receives further funding for Road Safety measures next financial year.

Recommendations:

The Constituency Committee is requested to:

- **Note that the decisions made by the Road Safety Task Group**

2.5 St Paul's Community Hub

St Paul's Roman Catholic Primary School in Beechwood was awarded £25,000 in early 2015 to provide a school readiness hub for two year olds. The hub started at Easter which focuses on the following areas:

- Speech and language therapy for two year olds
- Speech and language workshops for parents
- Improvements to outdoor play
- Parent and children workshops on numbers, speech, cookery and craft
- 4 week Christmas craft courses
- Family art project
- Family drop-ins to address issues
- Read and rhyme
- Holiday clubs
- Partnership work with Children's Catholic Society

Further details of the project can be found in appendix 6.

Clean For The Queen is being led by a number of litter charities from all over Britain and has the backing of several high-profile companies. The aim is to acknowledge the Queen's 90th birthday this year by encouraging groups all over the country to clean up their local area. It is appropriate timing as the first ever nationwide litter campaign took place in 1953, the year of the Queen's coronation, and led to the establishment of Keep Britain Tidy. This is one part of ongoing activities that take place under the banner, 'Love Wirral'.

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Application for support with food based projects at the St James Centre.

The St James Centre is a non-discriminatory environment offering access to learning, family services, community activities and welfare support. Our café is at the heart of our building and our approach to service delivery. Our food based initiatives have developed significantly in the last 2 years, with support from a range of funders. We apply to the Constituency Committee for support to enable these to develop further and become sustainable.

Our programme would offer the following:

Cafe based projects:

Targeting the whole community with particular focus on lone adults/isolated and vulnerable

- Monthly meal share – targeting 10 families per event
- Bi-monthly community event (afternoon tea, bingo, themed meal)
- Seasonal family events – children’s discos, parties and events
- Big lunch & community food celebrations (feed the 5000, in partnership with other members of Feeding Birkenhead)
- Recipes for cafe users highlighting how we have used left overs including ideas for solidarity fridge (education)
- ‘Pay as you feel’ cafe – working with The Real Junk Food Project, Manchester (to be developed with partners and piloted)
- Breadmaking, cake making and seasonal recipe drop in sessions

Expansion of fare share based projects to include weekly soup kitchen.

- Extension of links with Wirral Community Trust Health Action Area (already work with WCT on cooking for diabetics, for instance)
- Delivery of cooking courses with accreditations in partnership with Faiths4Change (L2 Food hygiene and L1 Nutrition awards)
- Development of a colour cafe (using art of colouring to explore health and wellbeing – new initiative) in partnership with WCT
- Creation of outdoor growing areas (at front and side of building) – linking with Incredible edible & WEN
- Supporting Oxtan Gateway’s allotment projects
- Community growing projects at the St James Opp Shop

Family learning:

Birkenhead Constituency Team Neighbourhood Engagement Update
January 2016

Neighbourhood engagement is a vital element of the Birkenhead Constituency Committee work.

There are a number of projects being developed in partnership with the local community, statutory organisations and community and voluntary groups that will benefit Birkenhead in the future.

Here is an update on how a number of these projects are progressing and the benefit they will bring to the community.

Birkenhead Library Pocket Park application

Working in partnership with Birkenhead Central Library and Involve Northwest, the Birkenhead Constituency Team has submitted a funding application to the Pocket Park Fund to build a pocket park on the unused space at the back of the library.

If the funding application is successful the space would be transformed into a reading and health and wellbeing park which can be used by library users, local residents and schools. Adding onto the services offered by the library the park could even include a mini-amphitheatre which local schools can use for outside reading sessions.

A decision on the funding is due at the end of January 2016.

Upton Railway Station

The Birkenhead Constituency Team were approached by Merseytravel for suggestions on how the local community could be involved in potentially improving the look of Upton Railway Station.

To help facilitate the project the Birkenhead Constituency Team met with Ridgeway High with the view of the schools art class becoming involved with the project.

Currently discussions are taking place between Merseyrail and Merseytravel but if confirmed the project will see art students from Ridgeway High improving the station by painting murals of prominent Wirral landmarks which will then be situated at various points at the station for rail users to enjoy.

Alderley Avenue Alley

The Birkenhead Constituency Team continues to work with local residents and the Anti-Social Behaviour Team on a solution regarding the issues of anti-social behaviour and substance misuse in the alley way at Alderley Avenue, Claughton.

These issues have been occurring for a number of months with residents being asked to report any instances so a clear picture of when the issues are occurring can be formed. The Birkenhead Constituency Team and Anti-Social Behaviour Team will be meeting to discuss the next steps on resolving the issues the residents at Alderley Avenue face.
