### **REPORT SUMMARY**

The purpose of this report is to consider an application to license a Mercedes Vito, registration number LC11 MSY, outside of the current age policy for licensing Hackney Carriage Vehicles.

### **RECOMMENDATION/S**

That the Regulatory Panel consider whether to license the Mercedes Vito, registration number LC11 MSY, as a Hackney Carriage Vehicle.

### 1.0 REASON/S FOR RECOMMENDATION/S

1.1 It is a delegated function of this Panel to determine applications to change the vehicle on an existing Hackney Carriage Vehicle Licence when the replacement vehicle is over ten years old.

### 2.0 OTHER OPTIONS CONSIDERED

2.1 That the application to license the Mercedes Vito, registration number LC11 MSY, be refused as the vehicle does not comply with the current age policy for licensing Hackney Carriage Vehicles.

### 3.0 BACKGROUND INFORMATION

- 3.1 The age policy for licensing Hackney Carriage Vehicles is as follows:
  - Every vehicle presented for licensing for the first time must be three years old or less from the date of first registration or date of manufacture (whichever is the earlier).
  - In circumstances when a Hackney Carriage Vehicle proprietor wishes to change a Hackney Carriage Vehicle that is currently licensed to a different vehicle, the replacement vehicle must be the same age or less than the vehicle that is currently licensed, up to a maximum of ten years old. Vehicles that are ten years old or more must be replaced by a vehicle that is no more than ten years old
  - Once a vehicle reaches 10 years of age it will be required to be tested every six months and a six monthly licence will be issued.
- 3.2 Wirral Car Solutions Ltd currently hold a Hackney Carriage Vehicle Licence for a Peugeot E7, registration number SH58 BMU which is 13 years old. They have applied to replace this vehicle on that licence with a Mercedes Vito, registration number LC11 MSY, which is 11 years old.
- 3.3 The Mercedes Vito, registration number LC11 MSY, was previously licensed by Wirral Council as a Hackney Carriage Vehicle until 10 August 2022 when the licence expired.
- 3.4 The date of first registration of the Mercedes Vito is 25 July 2011.
- 3.5 The vehicle has been examined at one of the Council's authorised testing stations and the MOT and Compliance pass certificates will be provided in advance of the meeting.
- 3.6 The vehicle will be available for inspection at the meeting.

  - 1. Vehicles must be under 3 years of age from the date of manufacture or date of first registration, whichever is the earliest.
  - Once a vehicle reaches 10 years of age it will be required to be tested every six months and a six monthly licence will be issued.
- 3.2 The proprietor of the vehicle, Mr Winstanley has applied to license the vehicle for twelve months.
- 3.3 The vehicle was licensed as a Hackney Carriage Vehicle until 3 September 2022 when the licence expired.
- 3.4 Mr Winstanley was unable to renew the Hackney Carriage Vehicle Licence before the expiry date as he was unable to obtain the necessary parts in order for the vehicle to pass the MOT and Compliance Test
- 3.5 The vehicle has been examined at one of the Council's authorised testing stations and the MOT and Compliance pass certificates will be provided in advance of the meeting.
- 3.6 The date of first registration of the vehicle is 31 December 2015.

### **REPORT SUMMARY**

The purpose of this report is to consider an application to license a Peugeot 508, registration number ML62 NLU, outside of the current age policy for licensing Private Hire Vehicles.

### **RECOMMENDATION/S**

That the Regulatory Panel consider whether to license the Peugeot 508, registration number ML62 NLU, as a Private Hire Vehicle for a period of six months.

### 1.0 REASON/S FOR RECOMMENDATION/S

1.1 It is a delegated function of this Panel to determine applications for Private Hire Vehicle Licences where the vehicle is over ten years old.

### 2.0 OTHER OPTIONS CONSIDERED

2.1 That the application to license the Peugeot 508, registration number ML62 NLU, be refused as the vehicle does not comply with the current criteria for licensing Private Hire Vehicles, in that it is more than 10 years old from the date of manufacture or date of first registration whichever is the earlier.

### 3.0 BACKGROUND INFORMATION

- 3.1 The current criteria that vehicles must comply with before being granted a Private Hire Vehicle Licence includes the following:
  - 1. Vehicles must be under 10 years of age from the date of manufacture or date of first registration, whichever is the earliest.
  - 2. Once a vehicle reaches 6 years of age it will be required to be tested every six months and a six monthly licence will be issued.
  - 3. Any vehicle which is more than 9 years and 6 months old will be issued with a licence that will expire on the day before it reaches 10 years old
- 3.2 The proprietor of the vehicle, Mr Bridson, has applied to license the vehicle.
- 3.3 The vehicle has been licensed as a Private Hire Vehicle since 2 March 2017 and the current licence is due to expire on 25 October 2022.
- 3.4 The date of first registration of this vehicle is 25 October 2012.
- 3.5 The vehicle has been examined at one of the Council's authorised testing stations and the MOT and Compliance pass certificates will be provided in advance of the meeting.
- 3.6 The vehicle will be available for inspection at the meeting.
