LW108	Growing the Community	The funding will be used to compliment an existing project being developed by the organisation, this project funded by the Awards for All programme and will see the large green space at the rear of the property developed and a Polly Tunnel erected. The project will provide an opportunity for local children to get involved in growing their own fruit and vegetables; this will be done in a group setting. The project will be run by volunteers from the local area, to ensure that they have the correct skills we are applying for funding to bring in an expert trainer who will deliver a one day course to enable the development of a year long plan to ensure that the project has maximum impact. The training will cover:  Why grow your own? Any space will do: Open ground Raised beds Containers  Knowing your soil: the key to successful growing Making your own compost Basic growing techniques: Corp rotation Mulching Sowing seeds Organic growing  The gardening year – what to do & when
LW36	Diversity Community Space	How to grow particular vegetables & fruit Participants will be provided with resources to take away which will provide a point of reference to guide activities throughout the year.  The funding will be used to purchase gardening tools, to help the volunteers that have been recruited to maintain Wirral Change front garden to be accessible to the diverse community in that area. Also this gives the volunteers an opportunity to have a small duty to help in self esteem and build their confidence.  The garden has different sections – a corner of benches and an area where the volunteers can grow plants. This funding could help maintain a community space that will be used by the diverse community groups that access the building e.g.  The Polish Group every Tuesday  Arabic Women and Children's group on Saturday  BME coffee morning every Friday
LW7	Buying Gazebos	Also to the local residents during weekdays, Monday – Friday 9pm-5pm.  We would like to purchase 4 gazebos for use at our allotment - We want to encourage as many people as possible to get involved with Bebington Road Allotment Society and take their own plot, grow their own fruit and vegetables while also providing somewhere waterproof as there are no buildings on site so we are at the mercy of the weather. The Society also hold events which include our Summer Fete, Big Lunch, Pumpkin party and other events - they are well attended by local residents and families so the purchase of the gazebos would benefit these events also.

LW35	Angela's Garden	The Scout Group own a plot of land at the rear of our Scout HQ. The land is overgrown and set at different height levels. We intend to landscape the plot into zones that can be used throughout the warmer months for community events to raise money for the Group and during other times for the enhancement of those that attend the Group to further their abilities and experience. The initial foundation for a large patio area has been completed with existing funds. The project is dedicated to one of our leaders who passed away suddenly in 2011. The intention is to start work in early March and have the area completed by early April. We intend to use the skills of parents/guardians and those within the group to do the work required. The funding is for materials only.
LW4	Clean it up!	I would like to start a resident involvement group with local people who are passionate like me to help support Central Park Wallasey in keeping it free of dog fouling. The funding will be used to purchase 1 Retriever city sack dispenser unit (Gladson-uk.co.uk) and to put it up in the park with permission from the council @ £120.20 each.  Also purchase a supply of re-fills @£26.96 for 250 bags x 13.
LW110	Brighten New Brighton - Chimichanga explores Wreckers and Smugglers	New Brighton's history includes stories of wreckers and smugglers at work on our shores. Today the reminders of their existence include Mother Redcap and the tunnels stretching from the Red Noses.  Working in partnership with the Momentary Art Project, a local Primary School and a local artist, Chimichangas will research and create a piece of art that will depict the Wreckers and Smugglers and the part they played in the history of New Brighton. The picture will be transferred onto panels which will be displayed on the art deco toilet block at the end of Harrison Drive and will offer a stylish welcome to New Brighton. The artwork will be in place for approximately 12 months, after which new or more permanent panels may be created reflecting public opinion of the artwork.  Chimichangas will benefit from closer links with a local school, the pupils will learn more about the history of New Brighton Wreckers and Smugglers, will gain artistic skills and will invest in their community, the school will have a chance to share the work of their pupils in a public place, and local people and visitors will enjoy visual art and a brighter building in New Brighton
LW92	Garden of Reflection	Our students have already undertaken a local community audit, looking at litter and areas around Leasowe that need to be improved. We would like to improve Leasowe with some community litter picks and encourage our local school communities to take pride in the area. We have talked to pupils from other schools and decided we would like to create a centenary garden ready for our remembrance celebrations. We would work to create a section each and make it a focal point for a big community event later in the year. We feel that if our students take a key role in coordinating community improvement work, then they will be less likely to litter in future. We will also be working with each of the primary schools on contributing projects that will create a bigger impact.
LW75	Time to Tidy	I am a lead worker on the National Citizen Service programme delivered through Catch22. We have a group of 10 graduates aged 16-18 who completed the programme during summer and autumn 2013. They are now looking to expand their skills and continue doing community action projects. During the summer they consulted with PCSO's based in Manor Road to look at areas of concern. The PCSO's identified a particular area that local residents were un-happy with. As a group our graduates would like to have funding to be able to renovate the area, plant new shrubery and make people

		aware of how littering becomes a problem. The area is a main cut through route for pupils attending Weatherhead School, which the graduates will work to inform them of this local issue. As this was identified by local PCSO's and residents we feel that the young people completing the project could make a real difference. The area is called Blue Bell Woods off Burford Avenue, Wallasey.
		Students from Wallasey School and residents have identified an area on the corner of Birkett Avenue and Castleway South, where some students sit on the wall, loiter and smoke at various times throughout the school day. Their litter is often disposed of in gardens and is seen as a problem by the school and residents.
LW68	Garden Design Competition	The problem was identified by a group of students taking part in Living Streets 'Campaign in a Box' project. These students will help take ownership of the garden and play a large part in its upkeep.
		We will tidy up the area by performing a litter pick with Wallasey School students, and then involve all the students in a 'garden design competition'. The winner will be chosen by local residents. The students will be involved in creating the small garden and its maintenance. The plants will make the area more attractive and dissuade from disposing of litter in that area. The raised beds will ensure there is nowhere to loiter.
		This project will link with other centenary work, clean ups, artworks and seed sowing in the area to ensure full participation. The groups involved in the projects will share the celebration as a whole community.
LW71	Leasowe Clean Up	We will be working with children and families from our local schools to clean up the area around 7waves/ the leisure centre and the adventure playground.  This is an area of anti social behaviour/ high amounts of litter and dog waste.  We will have a community clean up event, which will be supported by dog waste awareness, and targeted services. We will clean up and create some
		new planting that will reflect the remembrance work that is happening across Leasowe. We will be working with students from all schools to host a Love Leasowe song, the winning one will be recorded and we will also host a name the road competition to give young people ownership of our area. This project will be the start of a range of remembrance activities that will bring our community together
LW65	Cosa Kerb Appeal Project	Seacombe Community Centre, known locally as the Cosa (Children Of Seacombe Association), is in the process of being remarketed and promoted as a valuable local community resource. The building looks 'tired' from the outside and is in desperate need of a lot of 'kerb appeal'.
		It is visible from the promenade as people walk by. To make the building look friendlier, inviting and welcoming the committee would like to purchase some paint for the outside of the centre and buy some colourful hanging baskets.
		In its heyday New Brighton boasted the Tower Gardens, where rides, shows, music, animals, tea rooms all went to make a booming leisure resort and a brilliant destination for visitors and locals alike and today we still enjoy the rides and bright lights of Adventureland.
LW97	Brighten New Brighton - The Momentary Art Project celebrates the Fairground	MAP will work in partnership with a local school in the Wallasey Constituency and with a local artist to research and create a piece of art that will celebrate New Brighton Fairgrounds. LW83	Oakdale Outlook - Gates and Garbage	the Fairground, invest in their local area and will gain artistic skills; the School will have a chance to share the work of their pupils in a public place, and local people and visitors will enjoy visual art and a brighter building in New Brighton.  We request £300 to refurbish our three entrance gates. They are 100 years old and we think they would improve the look of Oakdale and Gorsedale Road as well as helping to keep our children safe. We also request £100 to but litter pickers and tabards suitable for our staff and children. We want to help pick up litter in the area around the nursery, and to involve the children in this too, where it is possible and safe.
		For over 110 years ferries transported visitors to the seaside resort of New Brighton and many people share memories of arriving in New Brighton by Ferry. Today the ferries are visible from the shore as they transport visitors up to the entrance of the Mersey.
LW98	Brighten New Brighton - Mount Primary School celebrates the Ferry Boats	Working in partnership with the Momentary Art Project and a local artist, Mount Primary School will research and create a piece of art that will celebrate the Ferries and the part they played in the growth of New Brighton. The picture will be transferred onto panels which will be displayed on the art deco toilet block at the end of Harrison Drive and will offer a stylish welcome to New Brighton. 		Mount Primary School pupils will celebrate the Ferries, invest in their local area and will gain artistic skills; Mount Primary School will have a chance to share the work of their pupils in a public place, and local people and visitors will enjoy visual art and a brighter building in New Brighton.
		Our church is on the crossroads of Poulton Road and Gorsey Lane and we also have a car park on the diagonally opposite corner. We would like to spend money tidying up the car park and smartening up the front of the church. The work would be undertaken by volunteers.
LW25	Renew The Gateway	Both sites are very visible to particularly the travelling public (cars and buses) and sit at the gateway of Wallasey as people come and go to the tunnel. We feel that spending a modest amount on renewing the shrubs and plants outside our church as well as painting the railings of the car park, litter picking, clearing weeds and providing a vandal proof waste bin would promote a smarter appearance to Wallasey as people come and leave the town.
		The car park space is used by customers of fast-food outlets in Poulton Road and rather than prevent people using the space, we would just like to provide a waste bin which would encourage people not to drop litter. Weeds need to be cut back and prevented from growing by concreting over the borders of the car park. The railings on the corner of the cross roads need re-painting. We also have a small area outside the church that would benefit from re-planting with robust, established shrubs.
LW39	Greenhouse Growers	Pupils have collected many plastic bottles but we still need money to buy wood to enable us to build a frame for our plastic bottle greenhouse. We also require tools, compost and plants/seeds. The project will benefit all pupils and parents, as food produced will be sold as an enterprise activity.
LW15	Birnham Road Small Alley Tidy	To tidy up the Alley area of Binham Road by Park Avenue and Sommerville School, paint walls, climbing plants etc
LW16	Park Avenue Alley Clean Up	Tidy up the Alley at the back of 2,4,6 Park Avenue and Park Road Wallasey, Paint alley walls and weed spray the floor to make area more useable and clean
LW17	Park Avenue/Withington Road Alley Tidy	Tidy up the Alley at the back of 1,3,5 Park Avenue and Park Road and Withington road Wallasey, Paint alley walls and weed spray the floor to make area more useable and clean

LW19	Caldy Community Gardening Project	The aim is to clear, plant and maintain neglected communal areas in the Village, to create planting schemes which are appropriate and attractive for residents, visitors and wildlife. The volunteers already working on this project have benefitted by meeting neighbours and combining their talents in a village based activity. We have already planted woodland trust saplings (as a hedge) and have already had volunteers work sessions for over the twelve month period	
LW58	Making S. Andrew's Visible	The funding is to enable us to cut back sycamore trees at the front of the Church of S. Andrew, West Kirby immediately overlooking Meols Drive. The Church is on the main road less than 1 mile from the Liverpool Golf Club so hundreds of people will pass the Church when the Open Golf Tournament is taking place.  The Church is Grade II listed and it is the finest example of Church architecture in the North West by the Architect John Douglas. Victorian Societies and Civic Societies travel from all over the North West to visit the Church on a regular basis because of its significance.  Unfortunately, the building is completely obscured from Meols Drive by trees in June and July when they are in full leaf. It would be wonderful to have the	
		Church building more visible to those visiting West Kirby for the Open Golf Championship. It would show off one of the finest buildings in West Kirby.  The west pavement along Charles Road is obstructed by a large number (ca	
LW48	Temporary Bin Screening Charles Road/Fire House, Hoylake	25) Eurocarts for rubbish from the Market Street properties which back onto Charles Road. They and the nearby Eurocarts in the Fire Station courtyard are significant eyesores and impede public access for the disabled and other pedestrians. They detract from the appearance of the public realm. The bid aims to screen the bins in their current or adjacent locations.	
LW21	Car park renovation	Birkenhead Angling Club have just replaced our main access gates but the car park surface is very muddy, unsightly and presents a slip hazard to our older, less capable (aged) members. We have built accessible platforms from the car park but we need 40 tonnes of crush and run aggregate to cover the car park surface to make it safe, accessible and pleasant to look at.	
LW40	Rake Lane Upton Environmental Enhancement	The area around the entrance to the UVH section in Rake Lane has a problem with overhanging trees which need to be cut back. This will not only improve the outlook for neighbours and passers-by but will also give a safer passage down the Lane by improving visibility and closer parking.  The view across from the houses opposite are somewhat marred by the poor appearance of a Tennis Practice Wall, which with the help of the grant could be repainted and at the same time mark out a Junior Mini Tennis Court to help youngsters of 5, 6 and 7 to take up a healthy pursuit.
