We work with 70 families with a child with cerebral palsy and more recently have also been working with 15 older people with Parkinson's disease. In the last 12 months we have been working on an expansion plan to extend the number of people we can support. We have been concentrating on getting the right policies and plans in place, the right equipment and office space and we are now ready to recruit and train 10 volunteers to very specific roles. Most of the roles are absolutely ideal for older, retired individuals. This project meets two of the Your Wirral themes, namely, Providing employment and training for local people and Benefiting local people who face discrimination in this case old age. We want to advertise, recruit, train and retain 10 new volunteers to help the growth plan of our organisation. We have already secured some of the project costs.	We know the project is needed because we are struggling with the demand for our services. For the last 5 years now we have been operating a waiting list for our services, which are free. During an Operational Planning process, which included visiting a number of larger local charities to see how they operate, we identified that much of what we do could be allocated to trained volunteers. We know that quality volunteer opportunities where volunteers are trained, valued and given responsibility for decent projects are fairly scarce and we can provide 10 of these types of opportunities.
YW2	Striding Out CIC Social Enterprise_CIC Elaine Owen	Digital & IT Skills for Employability	The funding we are applying for meets the outcomes of the following pillars 4. Providing employment and training for local people; 6. Improving community facilities; 7. Engaging communities to improve quality of life. The funding would be used to help to provide training for local people of all ages who are currently unemployed or in low paid/seasonal jobs to provide them with IT and digital skills to make them more employable and able to apply for jobs and or promotions to a wider range of employers. We will provide access to internet enabled computers and the relevant software in order to help learners develop their digital skills to; a) create a professional sounding email addresses (from which to apply for jobs) b) Produce a professional looking & sounding CV c) Produce a short video CV of interesting information about themselves d) Upload their video to Youtube e) Email CV and You Tube link to prospective employers. The funding will help with the cost of communications, recruitment, training room hire, refreshments, training resources and a contribution towards transport costs for attendees.	According to the National Statistics Currently there 3.4% of the Population in Wirral are unemployed, however the figures do not reflect those in low income situations such as those that work part time and are in zero hour seasonal contracts. Wirral is currently the 10th worst nationally for economic deprivation which in turn makes the employment increasingly competitive. We wish to offer the best opportunity possible for unemployed people and people on low income benefits to gain employment and/ or higher paid employment. Our training will take place at Vale House Community Centre in New Brighton, close to the wards of Seacombe & Wallasey and less than a mile from the newly developed leisure sea front where there are many seasonal tourist/leisure seasonal jobs and many individuals are hired on a zero hour or low paid basis. We believe based upon recent findings from local research and feedback from the Wirral Employers Steering Group that an up to date electronic CV, a professional email and updated IT skills will assist all learners to find employment and help local employers to find employees.

In order to cut the vast outfield the club uses an ageing Ransomes 3 metre ride on outfield motor mower. These machines cost £40,077 new exclusive of VAT and the club could not possibly think in terms of such an outlay. The current machine is 12 years old and the club is looking to upgrade it to a newer model using funding together with the equity in the current mower. The funding would meet the following themes:- 1. Provide employment and training (in the art of cricket) for local people (including the local schools). 2. Improve community facilities (The cricket clubs outfield playing surface). We run a locally based charity and seen first hand the effects that it has on the children, so we opened club up and piloted it on our siblings and found it to be a fantastic success. YW7	The Open Door Centre Registered Charity Lee Pennington	The Big Life Series	Partnership between The Open Door Centre & NHS Early Intervention in Psychosis team. We will create four 5 minute high quality films, consisting of animation and recorded footage, to educate young people & teachers about the true nature of mental health issues. The films will cover different topics depression, anxiety, psychosis and how to seek help and be incorporated into comprehensive training packages which ourselves and others currently deliver Wirral wide. The films will be unique, peer-led and conceptualised / developed at all stages by young people with personal experience of these issues. Funding will facilitate 6 production sessions per film, with the intensive process led by leading local creative and mental health ofessionals.Beneficiaries will channel negative mental health experiences into positive impact with longstanding community benefits. We will tackle stigma and discrimination by providing a peer-lead, experience-based perspective on mental health in local schools. We will increase the quality of life of those with existing mental health issues, who are notoriously difficult to engage, by facilitating widespread psychoeducation and identifying available support avenues and access routes. Finally, beneficiaries will utilise diverse transferable skills including confidence building, team work, employability skills and creative sector experience.	850,000 children are currently diagnosed with a mental health condition in the UK, and there is evidence to show that 75% of these children do not receive the support that they need (BBC News, 2014). A large research study by University College London (2012) demonstrated that the provision of mental health self-help materials for children in school and training delivered to teachers by mental health professionals both had a statistically significant impact on reducing mental health problems, both emotional and behavioural, in school children. Young Minds (2012) highlight that young people know what its really like to be growing up and how mental health and mental health problems affect them and they want us to work together with them to find effective solutions to the problems they face. Furthermore, the NICE guidelines for the effective treatment of mental health problems, including psychosis (NICE, 2014), suggest utilizing peer workers to educate service users on experience-based self-management techniques. Though some projects are currently working towards having peer-lead mental health support provision in local schools (Wirral CAMHS 2014), there is currently no consistent, peer-created package that combines raising awareness for pupils with providing training for staff. The films aim to provide this in a modern, peer-lead, creative and widespread manner. From our clinical experience in both services, there is a clear lack of peer-created support for young people around these issues. Schools and indeed school-age individuals are often reluctant to discuss these issues for fear of discrimination. These films will add a new dimension to the training packages we already deliver to schools, providing widespread access to young people talking openly and honestly about their experiences. They will leave lasting legacy within their local community and will challenge the entrenched stigma that still exists in schools and beyond, increasing the quality of life of these individuals. Both partner organisations related to this project have extensive experience of supporting some of the most vulnerable young members of the community, with their work being recognised and celebrated on both a local and national level. We work in a creative, modern, peer led and forthright manner so we are very well placed to meet this need, deliver this project to the highest possible standards and are well versed in the manner and processes of working in this sector along with a thorough knowledge of the need which exists. This knowledge has been supplemented by feedback and consultation with leading local professionals including FACT (Foundation for Art and Creative Technology), Bido Lito! YW8	St Nicholas with All Saints Church - Harrison Hall Community Centre Registered Charity Keith Raybould	Harrison Hall - 'Tea and Talk'.	The project will be called 'Tea & Talk' and will be carried out initially on a monthly basis (either the first or last Saturday in the month - to be determined) between 2pm-4pm and held at Harrison Hall Community Centre, Wallasey Village. It will initially consist of the local community being invited into the Hall for a cup of tea and a biscuit (or cake) providing an initial contact point within the community and a means by which they can communicate with others any problems or concerns that they may have. It is hoped that this can be further enhanced in due course by providing an interface facility for such organisations as Citizens Advice /NHS & Council community services - ranging throughout the statutory services provided within Wirral by means of acting as a "sign post" to services available within the area.	There is continued evidence of people within the community being alone and without any help or guidance. It is not necessarily confined to the elderly, but also those suffering privation and financial difficulties, as well as youngsters facing a myriad of issues. These needs have been identified within the local area by members of St Nicholas's church which manages the Hall on behalf of the community.
YW9	Wallasey Sea Cadets Registered Charity Ian Calder	Fire Alarm Upgrade	The current manual fire alarm is based on the "break glass" system, which means that a person inside the building discovering a fire has to activate the alarm by braking the glass of one of the various points situated around the building, call for assistance from the local fire service whilst evacuating the building. During overnight accommodation, the risks are heightened! If the building is not occupied when fire breaks out, there is no automatic detection and the fire service would only be called when a passer-by notices the flames, by which time much of the interior would be severely damaged and equipment lost. In these circumstances, the Unit would be without premises for some considerable time and the membership would suffer drastically and an amenity for the community would be lost. The proposed system will include Manual Call Points, Heat Detectors, Optical Smoke Detectors (including Ceiling & under floor voids), various Sounder/Beacons and will be connected to a Control Panel linked to the existing Intruder alarm and will be continuously monitored. In the event of fire breaking out, the alarms will sound and the monitoring station will call the key-holders or fire service as appropriate depending on the signals received.	The Management Committee, Staff and other users have been aware of the need for the upgrade for some considerable time, but as a charity, we have to raise funds as and when needed. Our previous large project has been to raise £33,000 to replace out 100 year old central heating system for the benefit of the Cadets, Staff and other users and to attract more daytime users of our building. The new fire alarm system will ensure the safety of all users
YW10	Moreton Community Lights Association Community _ Voluntary Group Angela Pouncey	Moreton Christmas Lights	The funding will be used towards the cost of new Christmas lights, the installation and removal of them. The project brings the whole community together at Christmas time.	Before there were Christmas lights in Moreton people and their families travelled to other towns where there was a light display to do their Christmas shopping, since we have had a light display people have shopped in Moreton

YW11	China Spirit UK CIC Social Enterprise_CIC Xingbo Liu	China Spirit Local Sports and Cultural Enrichment Programme	We wish to hold free taster workshops in Shaolin Kung Fu Tai Chi, etc. at popular locations within the community, to introduce children and adults to all our centre has to offer. Our aim is to increase the numbers of local people taking part weekly in sports and making use of our centre, meeting the Your Wirral theme of engaging communities to improve quality of life. We will meet the Your Wirral theme of Improving community facilities, by increasing the range of classes and activities that we offer at our centre. We will launch a Kung Fu themed circuit training class, and also a women-only Kung Fu for Self Defence class at our centre, which meets the Your Wirral theme of preventing crime or reducing fear of crime. China Spirit UK meets the Your Wirral theme of providing employment and training for local people: we employ a number of local people and we offer opportunities for training and voluntary work. As a Chinese cultural centre, we provide awareness of an appreciation for all Chinese culture, meeting the theme of benefiting local people who face discrimination.	In July 2014, China Spirit UK conducted research with the purpose of both improving our current activities and informing the development of future activities. We evaluated how our current activities have been received by our current students and their families. We also asked members of the public to complete a short questionnaire to explore their attitudes towards physical activity. Our research demonstrated that our classes and activities have been very positively received by our current students and their families. 76% of parents said they had noticed improvements in their child's self esteem, confidence or that they seemed happier since attending China Spirit classes. 100% of students aged 9 and over said that they had improved their flexibility, stamina, core strength or overall fitness since attending China Spirit classes. We also carried out research with a class of pupils from a local secondary school with whom we were delivering a lion dance workshop. Two thirds of the class said that they had really enjoyed the workshop and 90% said that they would like to try a range of activities offered by China Spirit again in the future. However, 50% of the pupils said that they would not take part due to lack of confidence, concerns about not being good enough to do it, not wishing to go alone or concerns that the classes would be too hard for them. This demonstrates to us a need to take our classes out of the centre and engage with local young people in locations in which they are familiar and comfortable. By doing this, we hope that we will increase their confidence to be able to attend classes at our centre and to gain the benefits of once a week participation in sport. Our research also demonstrated that there was strong interest amongst members of the public in launching new kinds of classes, in particular, a class for women only in Kung Fu for self defence, and also in circuit training classes.
YW12	4th Moreton Scout Group Registered Charity Ian Johnston	Angela's Garden	The funding is to purchase items for both Project Angela's Garden and 4th Moreton Scout Group. The Group have owned a piece of land at the rear of the hut since 1928. In March this year volunteers in the group started a large scale landscaping to provide an area safe for the children and to enable the wider community to have access via social events which in turn help raise funds for the Group. Some items requested have a joint role in that they would be used for our Group camps held away from the hut. This benefits those children from the community who may not otherwise be able to enjoy a holiday. The landscaped area is already looking better than the waste land that it was and will continue to blossom with additional funding, thus improving facilities open to the community for events they may wish to organise. By engaging the local children in Scouting and Girl Guiding we hope to set standards of expectation as they grow through the years, the funding we ensure this continues to be possible. The Defibrillator could save a child/parents life and I know of at least one child, who plays in our league, where the school have installed these because of his health condition. The Residents complain of players cleaning boots on the surrounding pavement and the provision of bootscrapers would help with this problem. We have the problem of dog excrement and rubbish left by teenagers to clean up before the games and the litter picking and pooper scoopers would be a boon. I garden trolley would help to transport the equipment around the ground. The project would create an attractive and safe environment for the children and residents.</p>	<p>The Cleaning equipment is required to allow us to provide a healthy playing area with removal of dog excrement, removal of broken bottles, tin cans and other rubbish. Local residents complain of mud left outside the ground. We can show that we are attempting to combat this problem. It is an ideal situation to have a Defibrillator where there are large groups of people. As stated previously at least one child is at risk and I remember some years back a child who played in one of my clubs teams who collapsed and died on the pitch. If a Defibrillator had been present he may have been saved.</p>

YW19	SS Peter, Paul and St Philomena's Church/ Dome of Home Registered Charity Canon Amaury Montjean	Illuminate the Dome of Home	<p>Illuminating the Dome is an attractive improvement project contributing to local economic regeneration; a durable legacy, developing this heritage site for the whole community (Themes 1, 2, 4, 7). This will give a sense of identity to the area, attracting visitors and trade to a regenerated New Brighton. The illumination will improve economic sustainability giving local people an enhanced sense of place and pride, and raising aspirations of young people. Visitors are impressed by the beautiful view, size of the building, silence and peaceful atmosphere that pervades and illumination will be especially aesthetically satisfying. After significant public support, from Love Wirral in March 2014, Davies Partnership prepared designs for planning permissions to illuminate the Dome of this Heritage site. The design proposes to install four, cool white, LED projectors, to project light only where required with at least 17 years lifespan, aimed at the main Dome to compliment the green of the copper. Sensors and timers will detect light levels to control output. In addition, further LEDs will be installed inside the Dome to shine through the high-level windows, showing activity inside. This will attract visitors from Wirral, Liverpool and beyond to benefit local residents, business and all Wirral.</p>	<p>With very little notable architecture to look at from Liverpool, floodlighting the Dome will create interest in this side of the water and remind people of the wonderful building waiting to be explored. A real asset, it will enhance Wirrals sky line at night, echoing the well-photographed waterfront on the opposite bank of the Mersey. The Dome has begun a highly visible Heritage Lottery funded project restoring the roof. This project has brought local people together to work towards repairing, fundraising and showing visitors the heritage of this church. Steadily, as people realise it is open and they are welcome, more people are getting involved. Volunteer numbers have risen since March 2012 from 20 to over 60 people who regularly help. Many groups interested in history and architecture, notably architects from 20th Century Society, Hoylake Civic Society and Heswall U3A, have booked heritage tours and have been excited by proposals to illuminate. Supported by local councillors and the Mayor of Wirral, who enjoyed a Guided Tour in June 2014, the project to illuminate the dome shows the whole community that the aesthetics of the whole site are important, and of benefit to everyone in the local community.</p> <p>We were encouraged by the success of the Love Wirral community vote to illuminate the Dome, in January 2014, achieving 5th place out of 27 projects that applied for funding, and proving significant local support. When this iconic heritage site is illuminated it will become a beacon for the local community and testament to the volunteers working together for the benefit of the whole area. The Association of Town & City Management has developed Purple Flag accreditation for urban areas to help transform town centres at night and improve their evening economy partly by showcasing heritage buildings. According to Graham Phoenix writing in www.buildingconservation.com, good exterior and area lighting can play a hugely positive role in the way people feel about their environment: it can reveal and enhance our buildings aesthetically, improve our sense of local identity, safety and civic pride; effective, varied lighting of buildings ... is a sound investment that well justifies the relatively small capital and energy costs involved. Floodlighting the dome will be an enduring legacy that will draw even more visitors who are in search of heritage, a view and a peaceful retreat.</p>

There are very few places on Wirral where people with mental health issues, disabilities and learning difficulties can go that is within easy reach for them, 25 people at least over the last six months who used to use the day centres have told us this. The psychiatric nurses in Mill Lane refer people to our group. The Mental Health forum also refer on to our group. Per week we get at least 6 people needing help with issues like benefits and depression (thoughts of suicide) and we put them in the hands of the professionals if needed. These people feel safe talking to us, as they feel they cannot talk to professionals. People are able to bring their children as well which means they can come even if they have childcare responsibilities. Our volunteers will go with them to doctors appointments, etc if needed. The comfortable atmosphere we hope to create within the allotment plot would benefit parents requiring an informal relaxed setting in which to access services or advice that they would not otherwise be able to get to. For example some people may not wish to access the Centre to ask for help where as may be more at ease visiting a support worker and talking things through whilst helping out on the plot. This could be extremely beneficial for people suffering domestic abuse, people with mental health issues etc. The plot could contribute to providing employment and training as it would create a responsibility and help local unemployed people with work readiness. Helping out on a project like this can also help by easing depression and giving a sense of achievement and success. The Adult Learning Centre and other training facilities would be welcome to use the plot for gardening courses, training purposes and become involved in the whole project. Having a community project such as our allotment can help prevent crime and reduce fear of crime by giving community members a joint goal to work towards as it is less likely to be vandalised if all the local people are working together on it. Our tools will not be kept on site and our other resources will be security marked and locked away. Our project can be linked to wellbeing outcomes in the success criteria. Promoting giving as local people would be giving their time to help out. The plot offers a quiet space ideal for local people and gives the opportunity to enjoy a new hobby, learn new skills and contribute towards a project within the community in which they live.
