The Future of Troubled Families: Supporting Families with Multiple Disadvantages

Overview

The 'Troubled Families Programme' is a targeted government intervention for families with multiple problems including crime, anti-social behaviour, truancy, unemployment, mental health problems, and domestic abuse. Local authorities engaged with 120,000 families during the first phase from 2012-2015, and claimed to 'turn around' approximately 99% of those identified and supported.

However, analysis commissioned by the Department of Communities and Local Government (DCLG) and undertaken by Ecorys questioned the validity of these claims, and highlighted a lack of "consistent evidence that the programme had any significant or systematic impact". These findings were corroborated by independent research from the NIESR, exposing the £1bn flagship initiative to significant criticism and leading to the 'Troubled Families Inquiry' conducted by the Public Accounts Committee.

In April 2017, the DCLG published the first annual report on the next stage of this programme, rolled out across all upper tier local authorities in England in April 2015, and aiming to achieve sustained progress with 400,000 families by 2020. This agenda seeks to transform the way public services are delivered, with holistic interventions reducing demand for reactive services, and subsequently achieving savings for the tax payer. The first evaluation report evidences positive effects for both families and services, with nearly 44,000 families making significant and sustained progress.

Whilst the efficacy of this initiative may remain unclear, the multiple disadvantages on which the criteria for a 'troubled family' is based, are still having a detrimental impact on the lives of many households in England. There are 3 million households (14.5%) where no member of the family has employment (ONS, 2017), with 1.3 million children living in workless households. In 2016, 2 million adults in the UK experienced domestic violence (ONS, 2016). School truancy continues to rise, with 20,000 people taken to court in 2015. It is therefore obvious that the integrated service provision encouraged by the Troubled Families programme is desperately required to tackle a cycle of deprivation and improve life chances nationwide.

With the Troubled Families programme set to run until 2020, this symposium will provide practitioners across local authorities, the police, social services, education, welfare and the housing sector with a timely and invaluable opportunity to learn from the first stage of this scheme and discuss how to effectively galvanise a range of local services around families in order to turn their lives around.
