1.0 INTRODUCTION

This report provides an update on the Wirral Plan progress since the last report was considered by Policy & Resources Committee in March 2023. This will be the final monitoring report of the Wirral Plan priorities for 22/23. Any outstanding actions will be included in the development of the new Council Plan, which replaces the Wirral Plan and also forms the next stage of the Improvement Plan. A separate final monitoring report to close down the Improvement Plan has also been produced. New monitoring reports and a new Performance Management Framework are being developed as part of the new Council Plan.

This report has been divided into the five Wirral Plan themes:

- Inclusive Economy
- Sustainable Environment
- Safe & Vibrant Communities
- Brighter Futures
- Active & Healthy Lives

2.0 WIRRAL PLAN THEME PROGRESS UPDATES

A summary overview of progress made against each of the Wirral Plan themes is provided, including case study examples, key performance updates and progress against the 11 'Big Ticket Items' identified for 2022/23. The tables will also identify how the theme and key deliverables will be captured as part of the new Council Plan.

FIRST WIRRAL YOUTH MARKET SUCCESS	As part of the Council's UK Shared Prosperity Fund (UKSPF) Phase 1 Investment Plan, the Council has developed a youth market programme comprising three youth market events up to March 2025. The first youth market event took place in Liscard Town Centre on Saturday 22 July 2023 from 10am – 4pm at the Cherry Tree Shopping Centre. Over 3500 people attended the event (average of 583 per hour) and 20 traders attended from 16-29 years of age. The event also hosted 3 performers and the 'Stand Out Trader Award' went to Harrison and Dom from Distinct Sportswear. Feedback from visitors and traders regarding the event has been overwhelmingly positive, highlighting how the event was well-organised, provided an opportunity for young people to gain valuable work experience, and helped to drive additional footfall to the town centre. Many traders also reported that the number of sales on the day exceeded their expectations and cited demand for more youth market events in future. Future events are currently being planned at other locations within the Borough, as part of the UKSPF programme.	<image/>

- **Regeneration Projects:** Work has been underway to deliver against the projects. Key highlights include launch of the new offices in Birkenhead Town Centre, construction underway at Wirral Waters for the 500 new apartments at Millers Quay, and the submission of planning application for a high-quality housing scheme at Hind Street, in partnership with Ion Developments.
- Business Support Service: From 1 March to 30 September, the Council's commissioned Business Support Service has engaged with 651 new businesses, providing intensive support to 198 businesses. 66 new businesses have been created through the business start up programme in this period. 176 jobs have been created by businesses that have received startup support during the same period. Case studies include supporting a local business to implement artificial intelligence tools to improve online marketing campaign effectiveness; supporting the business plan for a now thriving community space and café; supporting a manufacturer to implement a social value impact plan and maximise their environmental, social and corporate governance impact.
- Housing: Work continues to deliver and progress housing and regeneration projects. Key highlights since March 2023 include:

	 96 new affordable homes completed up to June 2023 with a total scheme value of £15.36m supporting the construction industry and a further 967 on site with 483 estimated to be completed before the end of March 2024 . 548 households in Wirral have benefitted from improved energy efficiency measures through programmes supported by the Council and via the Liverpool City Region Combined Authority accessing around £5million in national grant programme for the Borough. Prevented and relieved homeless for 607 households. Increase in provision of temporary accommodation by 9 units and a further 18 in progress to meet demands arising from homeless households, helping to reduce as much as possible the need and time families spend occupying bed and breakfast accommodation.
	• Culture: In August 2023, thousands of visitors flocked to Thurstaston for 'Imagine Bamboo is Everywhere', one of the highlights of Wirral Country Park's 50th anniversary programme of events. Crowds were treated to large bamboo artwork, bamboo bikes and a bamboo orchestra. Children enjoyed trying their hand at circus skills, limboing and the crafting workshops in the Visitor Centre.
	• Borough of Culture 2024: Exciting activity is underway to plan the programme for Wirral becoming Borough of Culture in 2024. This is awarded annually on a rotational basis to one of the six local authorities that make up the Liverpool City Region, as part of the Combined Authority's culture programme.
	 Wirral's programme is a collaboration between the Council and a wide range of creative and community partners from across the borough. It has been designed to encourage participation in cultural activity and provide a lasting legacy. The vision for 2024 is that Borough of Culture should be a celebration of Wirral people and places and a showcase for its creative communities and the power of culture and heritage in regeneration. Borough of Culture provides a vital opportunity to highlight how culture plays an essential role in creating places people want to live, work and spend time in and a platform to tell Wirral's story and celebrate its unique heritage.

	• Wirral Ways to Work Programme: The Worklessness Support Service, part of the wider Wirral Ways to Work Programme, is delivered by Involve Northwest and provides personalised employment support to residents across the borough who are out of work. In the 12 months to September 2023 this service has engaged with 748 residents, supporting 559 into employment, education and training.
	COMMUNITY WEALTH & INCLUSIVE GROWTH
PROGRESS UPDATE FROM MARCH 2023	 Community Asset Transfer: A Community Asset Transfer Policy has been adopted and is encouraging the set-up of community-based organisations and cooperatives in the local community. In 2022/23, eleven different assets were considered for potential community asset transfer with positive outcomes agreed for six assets and two currently being developed. Community Wealth Building is at the heart of our regeneration:
	 Planning agreements as part of Left Bank developments have been reviewed to secure social value through employment and skills agreements. Innovative methods to increase meaningful community engagement in project/masterplan designs have been developed. Work with the Public Health Team and Community, Voluntary and Faith (CVF) sector is continuing to increase the range and scope of volunteering opportunities.
	 Procurement and Fair Employment: The Council is working in partnership with anchor organisations in Wirral and across the City Region to focus on Procurement and Fair Employment to embed social value across supply chains to generate economic and social value; apprenticeships for care leavers and employment opportunities.
	• Partnership working: Wirral Community Health & Care (WCHC) has become the first NHS organisation to obtain the Level 1 Quality Mark for Social Value. Wirral Met College is working with us to support the regeneration of Birkenhead Town Centre, ensuring access to employment and training for young people.
	• Sustainable Inclusive Economy: We know that the Climate emergency means we have to build a sustainable inclusive economy. We

	have the natural and technological assets to be leaders in the green industrial revolution in Wirral and across the region. Mersey Tidal is one key example, where we are building the case for a globally significant asset that will help the country in moving to predictable, alternative, and long-term energy.
PROGRESS SINCE MARCH 2023	 Community Asset Transfer: several asset transfers are progressing for the former libraries towards completion in the next few months. Members have also agreed the transfer of Brackenwood Golf Course which is progressing. Sustainable Inclusive Economy: Twenty state-of-the-art construction technology sales jobs will be created in Birkenhead this year, thanks to the launch of a new regional hub by Causeway Technologies. Causeway's new office at Peel L&P's Hythe in Wirral Waters, Birkenhead was officially opened by British hockey star Sam Quek MBE. Hythe is among the top 10 percent of all buildings for its green credentials, achieving a BREEAM Excellent rating by including low carbon procurement initiatives and innovative construction techniques which set high standards in environmental sustainability. Efficient building systems, sustainable urban drainage, the installation of photovoltaic panels, electric car charging points, cycling facilities, and future provisions for bike charging points all contributed to this achievement.

PROGRESS Key priority actions were identified for action in 2022/23 to ensure the Council continues the trajectory to keep pace with the carbon budget and meet the net zero target by 2030. These have been outlined below alongside progress made to date:

UPDATE FROM **MARCH 2023**

- Environment & Climate Emergency Declaration: Implement the recommendations and action plan following a detailed audit of the Council's response to the environment & climate emergency declaration. Recommendations from internal audit have been put into a management plan and are being implemented.
- Green Fleet Strategy: Establish a Green Fleet Strategy for the Council. The production of the Green Fleet Strategy and a full review of the Council's fleet and its use are underway.
- Electric Vehicle Strategy: Develop an Electric Vehicle (EV) strategy for the borough, work has been completed on the production of the strategy which is due to be launched next year.
- Decarbonisation Plan: Establish a decarbonisation plan for building emissions and create a 'project pipeline' to enable funding bids.
- Tree Planting: Tree planting season is underway for 2022/23 with the aim of planting over 21,000 trees. I-trees survey has completed field collection data from over 200 survey sites and household surveys to collect cultural and social value data. The Pollinator strategy has also been approved by ECE&T Committee.
- Communication/ Resident Engagement: Increasing communication and engagement from residents and communities through a Climate Emergency Communications Strategy. A Community Climate Engagement Strategy is in draft. Proposals have gone to

	Liverpool City Region Combined Authority for a one stop volunteering hub utilising the UK Shared Prosperity Funding. This will
	incorporate a community climate champion element, as well as grants for community sustainability projects.
	• Awards: Aspire to become a Silver award carbon literate organisation and increase awareness and action from internal staff. A
	further 44 staff have attended carbon literacy training and 2 staff members have been trained to deliver the courses in-house to
	reduce costs in 2023/24. There is also more information available on Flo for staff and a monthly Climate Literacy newsletter.
	• Environment and Climate Emergency Action Plan: Increase accountability through a public facing ECEAP (Environment and Climate

	• Pollinator Strategy: Wirral Council's commitment to supporting pollinators such as bees, butterflies and other insects is continuing
	with long grasses and wildflowers growing freely on a number of identified sites across the borough. Prioritising pollinators is part
	of Wirral Council's response to the Climate Emergency and, depending on the location, these sites might be managed in different
	ways; by planting pollinator friendly flowers and plants, reducing weed removal in the area or not mowing grass verges when
	wildflowers of significance are in season. A full list of current sites was published on the Council website, alongside an opportunity
	for residents to suggest new ways of supporting pollinators.
	• Waste Management: The Government has released its Simpler Recycling plan and response to the 2021 public consultation on
	consistent recycling collections. The Council is currently developing the Waste Collection Strategy to address the requirements
	detailed in the Environment Act 2021, in line with the Simpler Recycling guidelines and timescales.
	• Street Cleansing: In total, six solar bins have been installed in West Kirby, three in New Brighton and one in Hoylake. Those in West
	Kirby replace those removed during the flood wall construction works. The bins use solar power to compact the waste to help
	manage litter and collection of it.
	• Sustainable Travel: A major new cycling and walking route surrounding part of Wirral Waters is now complete.
	The Greenway, which forms part of the Liverpool City Region Freeport and runs along the north side of Beaufort Road and the east
	side of Wallasey Bridge Road, provides an attractive and sustainable travel corridor, with a walkway and off-road cycle route.
	• Green Fleet: Work on developing a Green Fleet Strategy has commenced with an initial review of the Councils fleet usage, vehicle
	requirement and future requirements being undertaken. Work has also commenced in collating the various approaches undertaken
	by others to inform a future strategy and delivery model.
	 Electric Vehicle Strategy: A consultancy are developing the Electric vehicle strategy, due for completion in November 2023. The
	strategy will be taken to ECET committee anticipated March 2024.
	 Tree, Hedgerow and Woodland Strategy: Tree, Hedgerow and Woodland Strategy: Procurement and implementation of new tree

- hedgerow and woodland provision in Wirral. Planting target met for the third year resulting in a net gain of 64,430 trees. A review of the strategy is currently in progress and will include a new chapter on Trees and Development and Natural Regeneration, updated policy references and case studies.
- **Biodiversity**: The Biodiversity and Net Gain Strategy was developed and approved at Environment, Climate Emergency and transport (ECET) committee in October 2023. A Biodiversity Net Gain Coordinator has been appointed and next steps are to develop the Biodiversity Action Plan.
- Air Quality Management Strategy: Workshops have been completed, alongside a public consultation and a draft strategy developed. Due to go to ECET committee in December 2023.
- **Communication/Resident Engagement**: The climate action hub is live and has hosted surveys and consultations on air quality, biodiversity and domestic burning. A complimentary microsite has been developed which launches in November 2023 to provide residents with useful information on how to reduce their carbon footprint. Rollout of a community climate champion initiative and a programme of green grants funded by UKSPF will begin in January 2024. The Eco school programme has been successfully working with schools within the borough and 52 Wirral schools achieved their green flag award in 2022/23. An Eco school council was established in 2023 and will work on various projects during the 2023/24 school year based on the themes earth, water and air.

£6.1 MILLION EARMARKED TO HELP WIRRAL RESIDENTS THROUGH COST-OF- LIVING CRUNCH	 Earlier this year the Government's Department for Work & Pensions awarded Wirral almost £6.1 million under round 4 of the Household Support Fund - known as HSF4 - as part of an £842 million package for Councils across England. The latest award means that Wirral has secured almost £15.25 million under the Household Support Fund since the scheme was launched in September 2021. - Fuel Poverty Grants: The Fuel Poverty Service commissioned to support residents. Since December 2022 the service has supported 505 residents with benefits and welfare advice, maximised residents benefits to the total of £909,585.08, supported 744 individuals with their attendance allowance and pension credit claims amounting to £1,639,199. 74 individuals have been provided with specialist fuel advice and 272 have been provided with a fuel voucher, 150 homes have received insulation support, 38 people have been given white goods and 16 people have been supported to switch energy supplier. The helpline has also supported 560 local residents with information and advice.
- **Cost of Living CVF Grants:** £1.4 million in grants distributed to the CVF sector to support local people and communities affected by cost-of-living.

PROGRESS UPDATE FROM MARCH 2023	 Joint Targeted Area Inspection: A Joint Targeted Area Inspection of the multi-agency response to children and families who need help in Wirral took place from 12 to 16 December 2022. The inspection was positive, with key headline findings outlined below. Prevention: A multi-agency Prevention Steering Group has been established and will provide support to those wishing to apple a preventative approach to services. Prevention programmes in other areas are also being progressed. Early Help Alliance: A newly commissioned Early Help Alliance has been implemented. Since launching on 4th April 22, the Family Toolbox has had over 3,000 unique users viewing over 19,000 pages in its first month.
PROGRESS SINCE MARCH 2023	• Wirral's Local SEND offer: A new website publicising the 'local offer' of support options for young people with special educational needs has launched in Wirral. Launched on 18 September 2023, the 'SENDLO' website (standing for SEND Local Offer) will share the most relevant, up-to-date and easily accessible information with families across the borough. Co-produce with parents, young people and a range of partners the new website has been developed to raise awareness of the SEND local offer in Wirral and signpost families to the support and services they need.
	• Fostering Support: Foster families enjoyed a chance to connect and support each other as part of a dedicated activity morning in Birkenhead Park in August 2023. Set up specifically to encourage Wirral Council's foster carers and children who are looked after to meet, connect and share their experiences, the event was full of games, arts and crafts. Events like these are just one example of how the council works with foster families, along with regular training, peer mentors, and financial support.
	 Family Hubs: The first Family Hub opened in Seacombe in August 2023. The Hubs will serve families with children aged 0-19 (we to age 25 with SEND) prioritising ease of access, building connections and strengthening relationships. Family Hubs will also provide information and support to adults in those families, whether that may be for women's health issues, or advice on lifelong learning and employment. Seacombe Family Hub will offer a wide range of services for families including: Group activities for families to support their child's development Accessing health appointments with midwives Health visitors Accessing services when relationships in your life might need some support Library and foodbank services
	 Ofsted recently published national research into Joint Targeted Area Inspections highlighting good practice from across the country. Wirral was one of the areas referenced, with highlighted activity including: Wirral had a 'care navigator' role. These care navigators helped families get early support while waiting for mental health services. It linked to child and adolescent mental health services (CAMHS) but had a positive impact on children and families by concentrating on wider needs, such as helping people access housing services, parenting courses or food an fuel vouchers. These oversight roles meant that leaders could respond to gaps in services on the ground.
	- The 'social workers in schools' pilot project worked well. Following positive feedback from the local authority and the participating schools, the area had matched funding to roll the project out to primary schools in the area.
	 Some areas, such as Wirral, made their early help offer as accessible as possible. Services were located where they were needed, and people could walk in off the street to get help. Other areas encouraged an open-door policy by running family sessions, which encouraged families to engage with workers without judgement and without needing to give information.
	- The domestic abuse hub in Wirral is a good example of accessible multi-agency local service design. The hub offers safe

Merseyside Police and local charities. This helps survivors of domestic abuse to access a range of help in one place. The positive work it does in the community is spread through word of mouth. The fact that anybody can make contact encourages people to use it. The hub is located with other facilities for parents, such as somewhere to have tea and coffee or to bring children to play, as well as a family drop-in centre. This all makes it more appealing and potentially less stigmatising.

confidential, in-person support to survivors of domestic abuse. It brings together workers from children's social care,

The police fund a team in the hub focusing on the assessment of perpetrators. They carry out a comprehensive analysis of the risk posed to anyone, including parents and children. Information can then be shared with other relevant agencies, for example with social workers, who can assess the risk presented by perpetrators. This means their investment in specialist work is also enhancing the work of other agencies.

- Wirral used a comprehensive area needs analysis to develop an approach based on the area's specific needs. It engaged hundreds of families and agencies through a consultation in order to assess its offer of services in areas with highest need. The needs analysis identified a lack of trust towards services. Leaders focused on reducing barriers around trust and created an 'earliest help' approach, to make initial support easy to access and build an alliance with communities.

	 Wirral also set up specific services following the analysis, such as 'Cradle to Career' and the 'Early Help Alliance', part of which involved developing a family toolbox website clearly detailing its services. Building and establishing relationships with a lead professional can provide very effective support for families. In Wirral, police community support officers (PCSOs) involved in early interventions were praised for their direct work with children. This included talking to children in settings they had chosen, such as while playing pool. Families noticed what a positive impact the safety and support that PCSOs provided had on their lives.

- Excellence in Drug and Alcohol Service Provision: In July 2023, the Office for Health Improvement and Disparities (OHID) visited Public Health to review the system and range of services being delivered in Wirral, in relation to substance misuse. OHID met a wide range of local partners engaged around this agenda across drug and alcohol support services, health, criminal justice and CVS partners. The feedback was extremely positive.
- Qualitative Insight Team: The team established and produced key insight work through engagement with local people to help inform key council projects such as Dock Branch Park, Sexual Health re-commission, Cost of Living and Drug and Alcohol joint strategic needs assessment.
- Visit from Professor Carla Treloar: In August Wirral hosted a visit from Scientia Professor Carla Treloar, a very distinguished researcher recently appointed as a Member of the Order of Australia (AM) for her significant service to social research. Her visit to the UK was by invitation of OHID and after a tour of the Wirral service provision, Professor Treloar discussed the stigma reducing potential within the new Wirral Drug Strategy 2023-2027, the Wirral Ways Drug Treatment and Recovery Service offer, and the work that has taken place in Wirral to reduce Blood-Borne Viruses.
- Single Front Door for Volunteering Awarded: Wirral CVS has been awarded the eighteen month contract, funded with UKSPF monies, to co-ordinate and deliver a single front door for volunteering across the borough including supporting the green champions and a grants programme to support grass roots organisations with green projects.

PROGRESS UPDATE FROM MARCH 2023	 Partnership Working: The Council continues to lead successful partnership working with public, private and community & faith sector partners to improve the borough. A Partnership Summit took place on 16th November 2022 and the Wirral Place Based Partnership Board met for the first time on 13th October 2022. Wirral Strategic Partnership Review: Review of Wirral's Strategic Partnership is underway to propose refreshed partnership arrangements, building on successful arrangements already in place. Significant progress during 2022 to establish new Health and Care Partnership working - inaugural meetings of the NHS Cheshire and Merseyside, the ICB for Cheshire and Merseyside, came into being on 1 July 2022. Liverpool City Region/ Neighbouring Partners: The Council is playing a key role in the Liverpool City Region Combined Authority, driving Wirral's interests and securing substantial funding to deliver Wirral priorities. Wirral Chairs the Mersey Dee Alliance (MDA), driving further opportunities to link Wirral, the City Region the wider region and beyond. The MDA is a successful partnership that supports strategic economic growth across North East Wales, West Cheshire and Wirral. Recognised as a single economic sub-region and having a population close to 1 million, the Mersey Dee area is a pivotal location in the UK.
PROGRESS SINCE MARCH 2023	 Partnership Working: The Council continues to lead successful partnership working with public, private and community & faith sector partners to improve the borough. Some examples of partnership working are (other examples have been referenced as part of other theme updates): Over the Summer period partners worked together (including Wirral Council, Wirral Coast Guard, Wirral Park Rangers, Merseyside Fire and Rescue Service and British Transport Police) to launch an initiative, called 'Openspace'. The initiative seen police officers working alongside partners to prevent serious violence and anti-social behaviour in key tourist hotspot areas, concentrating on popular parks throughout the Wirral and along the coastal areas in West Kirby and New Brighton. In June pupils from across the borough, and partners including Asthma Lung UK, Living Streets, Alder Hey and LIMU, at Eurekal Science + Discovery to talk about their findings for improving air quality. Partners pulled together in June to plan a series of events as part of a nationwide recognition of what the United Nations called the biggest post-war atrocity to happen in Europe: Remembering Srebrenica. Key elements of the contract include supporting the delivery of the Health and Wellbeing Strategy, supporting the delivery of the neighbourhoods programme and supporting small groups to grow and flourish.
	HEALTH PROTECTION & LIVING WITH COVID
PROGRESS UPDATE FROM MARCH 2023	 Wirral Health Protection Board: Re-established the multi-agency Wirral Health Protection Board which is responsible for the oversight of health protection arrangements in Wirral and providing assurance to the Health and Wellbeing Board that there are safe, effective, integrated arrangements and plans in place across the borough to protect the health of the population. Wirral Health Protection Service: The Wirral Health Protection Service within the Public Health Team is fully established and ensures a continued sustainable local approach to living with COVID-19 and to build on existing partnerships/working relationships developed during the pandemic. Partnership working: Partnership work has been undertaken to develop a Wirral Health Protection Strategy 2023-2027. An effective local approach to health protection is vital to improve health and wellbeing, protect the local economy, and reduce health inequalities. The Strategy sets out our collective approach to ensuring we have a resilient health protection system in Wirral to protect people from infectious diseases, environmental hazards and ensure we are prepared for future emergencies. Council Buildings: Activity is underway to assess ventilation within Council buildings and ventilation. This includes: Phased installation programme of CO2 monitors Natural ventilation is being maximised where possible.
PROGRESS SINCE MARCH 2023	 Spring Booster: Since the latest phase of the NHS COVID-19 Vaccination Programme started in April, more than 174,000 spring doses have already been given in the region by June 2023. Health Protection Strategy delivery: Wirral Council has co-developed a Health Protection Strategy with members of Wirral's Health Protection Board. The Board is a subgroup of Wirral's Health and Wellbeing Board with members from a range of Council services, NHS Cheshire and Merseyside Integrated Care Board (ICB), local NHS Trusts, NHS England and the UK Health Security Agency. Winter preparedness: The Health Protection Team have been working with partners to support the development of system winter plans with strong focus on prevention. This has included developing a respiratory infection system response plan, co-ordinating Winter Wellness communications, developing sector-specific winter preparedness checklists and rolling out e-Bug training sessions. Air Quality Strategy: The Health Protection Team have been supporting Environmental Health to co-develop an Air Quality Strategy for Wirral which is scheduled to be published by the end of the year.

Iaboration to Reduce the Impact of Antimicrobial Resistance: Wirral Health Protection Service along with local health partners ve recently won a national award for their work relating to antimicrobial resistance, which reduced hospital admissions in the over s by 22%. The project won the Infection Prevention Society for excellence Impact gold award for collaboration between the Wirral uncil's Health Protection Service, Wirral Community NHS Foundation Trust Infection Prevention and Control Team, and the timicrobial Stewardship Lead employed by WUTH.
