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# **Section 2:** What Council proposal is being assessed? Supplementary Substance Misuse Treatment and Recovery (SSMTR) Grant

In 2023/24 the SSMTR grant expanded the ADDER remit to include children and young people, and to acknowledge the interactions between alcohol and drug misuse. It also extended funding to all local authorities, with allocation based on need.

In 2023/24, Wirral was allocated £2.26 million in SSMTR grant funding. For 2024/25, Wirral has been allocated an uplift to £4,376,408, with a requirement to build or enhance lived experience initiatives.

Continuation of the grant with the uplift will enable the sustainability and expansion of local programme successes.

This grant is an enabling element in the delivery of the Wirral Drugs Strategy to focus on protecting children and young people; augmenting our outstanding treatment and recovery system; and reducing drug-related crime. We also focus on improving the health of people who use drugs, and preventing the early deaths that are seen too often. Throughout all work prevention will be key as well as our vision for a positive narrative for recovery, combatting the stigma associated with drug use, and strengthening the voice of people with lived experience.

Programme development and activity will be reported at the quarterly Wirral Combatting Drugs Partnership. This includes a wide range of partners and among them will be representation from agencies and services working with underserved groups. Equality of access will be a standing item on the agenda.

This programme is bringing very valuable capacity and quality to the delivery of these services. This will make a positive impact on all communities, in particular on those communities with higher levels of social deprivation and health inequality. The increasing capacity of this developing programme, along with the wide involvement of partners, considerations of inclusion will also provide for greater all-round inclusion.

We have examined an extensive range of data to support this development. This includes (but is not limited to) the following:

- National Drug Treatment Monitoring System data on those in treatment.
- Local service provider data.
- National Drug Prevalence studies data.
- Public Health Outcomes Framework data.
- Home Office data on crime and offending behaviour.
- Hospital admissions data.
- ONS data on drug-related deaths and deaths in treatment.
- Liverpool John Moores University data on syringe exchange activity, drug-related deaths, alcohol-related hospital admissions from trauma and injury, drug and alcohol users in the criminal justice system.

To inform the use of this data there is also an extensive body of research that supports the delivery approaches that our commissioning is being required to follow in the guidance that comes with this funding.
