The vision for the site, to include designing in a carbon-positive way and minimising environmental impacts elsewhere, as well as being pedestrian and cycle-centric, mirrors our own net-zero ambitions. Our own plans are assisted greatly by the promotion of sustainable, developerled sites and the encouragement of non-vehicular methods of travel. Furthermore, developments within brownfield sites, where public transport and active travel connections are already available or can be improved to cater for an expanding population, should be promoted ahead of sites where additional highway mitigation might be required. A Mix of Housing Types - Most comments say that homes should be affordable, both in terms of ownership and social housing. Participants also thought the mix of housing types should support a socially inclusive community gathering a mixture of people in terms of age, income level, and support needs. The housing mix should accommodate disabled people and include ground floor residences that are accessible, and curtilage parking for those who need it. It should also include larger family homes. People pointed out that green spaces were needed in residential areas too, along with homes with gardens and supported living. The idea of a mixture of houses and maisonettes was well-received	Responses online and to in person discussion supported the idea of a neighbourhood which could provide a mixture of accommodation types and enabled access to affordable living for a wide range of individuals and lead to the creation of a neighbourhood which is an attractive place to live	Focused engagement with wider age groups may be required to ensure potential buy in to proposals	No amendment to masterplan document as potential for wider engagement as proposals are progressed

New mixed community, with focus on families - This was one of the most commented on vision statements, with eleven comments in total. The accent in the responses was put on safety and on the need for a community centre. The community centre would be a safe place for everyone to reach out for help and would also cater for children with specific needs. The area should also cater for different age groups. Participants stressed the importance of having access to safe community spaces, such as a community centre and shared public green spaces, in particular for children and vulnerable people. They wished to see an area that caters to all types of needs, including artists and creatives who, if they can work and lie in the area, can being culture and skills to the community	Positive focus on development of community and community spaces within new neighbourhood to attract individuals and families to area	Respondents identifying requirement for inclusion of specific community centre to provide services and location for interaction rather than availability of facilities which can act as informal hubs within neighbourhood for community events etc.	No amendment to masterplan document as reflects position that community spaces should be included within development proposals – Masterplan Framework, Community benefits (page 30)

Retain existing businesses and provide new employment space - Comments made on this theme were varied, with eight comments in total. The idea of having a mix of business and housing together was popular, with people thinking it would help reduce isolation. The idea of offering creative working and business spaces was also positively received. One comment questioned what would happen to existing businesses area that would be moved. Most of the comments related to the type of businesses and activities people wished to see in the area. How the area connects to Birkenhead - Seven comments were received on this theme. Positive comments stated that the design choices were good ideas. One participant particularly liked the idea of bringing people back into the town centre. One person thought that better public transport would make the local community spirit stronger, and other declared that encouraging active travel and reducing car access and parking was a good idea. One person spoke against cycle lanes, saying that they get misused.
