REPORT OF THE DIRECTOR OF REGENERATION

DELEGATED AUTHORITY

1.0 **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

1.1 The purpose of this report is to seek the approval of Members for the Director of Regeneration to have delegated authority to grant Minor Variations under the Licensing Act 2003. Members are also asked to note the changes to the requirements for a Designated Premises Supervisor at community premises.

2.0 **BACKGROUND**

- 2.1 Amendments to the Licensing Act 2003 were introduced on 29 July 2009 to allow premises to apply for small variations that will not impact adversely on the Licensing Objectives. Premises are now able to apply to vary their Premises Licence and Club Premises Certificate under the Minor Variation process. On receipt of an application for a Minor Variation, the Licensing Authority must consider whether the variation could impact adversely on the Licensing Objectives. Amendments were also made to the Licensing Act 2003 to remove the requirement for a Designated Premises Supervisor at community premises, such as Village and Church Halls.
- 2.2 Under the minor variations procedure the following amendments to Premises Licence and Club Premises Certificates may be made:
 - (a) minor changes to the structure or layout of the premises
 - (b) small adjustments to licensing hours
 - (c) the removal of out of date, irrelevant or unenforceable conditions
 - (d) the addition of licensable activities other than the supply of alcohol
- 2.3 The Statutory Guidance issued under Section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003 states that the Government recommends that decisions on minor variations should be delegated to Licensing Officers. Decisions to remove the requirement to have a Designated Premises Supervisor at community premises will be made by the Licensing Act 2003 Sub-Committee if a Police objection is made. If no objections are made then the Licensing Officer will remove the Designated Premises Supervisor from the Premises Licence.
- 2.4 In considering the application for a Minor Variation, the licensing authority must consult with relevant responsible authorities if there is any doubt about the impact of the variation on the licensing objectives and they need specialist advice, and take their views into account in reaching a decision. For instance, an Officer would consult with Environmental Health on an application with possible public nuisance implications. However there is no requirement to consult all responsible authorities on each application and in some cases the licensing authority may be able to make a decision without consultation.
- 2.5 The Licensing Officer must also consider relevant comments from interested parties if they are likely to affect one or more licensing objectives. In the case of a minor variation,

there is no right to a hearing, but the Licensing Officer must take any comments into account when arriving at a decision.

- 2.6 If the Licensing Officer refuses the application for a minor variation then a full variation will have to be applied for and the full process would have to be followed.
- 2.7 In accordance with the Statement of Licensing Policy, Licensing Officers have delegated authority to deal with a number of applications without it being referred to the Licensing Committee, for example were there are no objections to applications. Currently, Licensing Officers are unable to deal with minor variations.
- 2.8 The Supplementary Guidance detailing the changes to the full guidance issued under Section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003 can be found at Annexe 1.
