This is the seventh report since the Council took back responsibility for public health





Wirral Public Health Annual Report 2020/21

In Wirral some communities experience better health than others.


- These differences are the most significant health challenge in Wirral. They impact on the quality of people's lives, the way they use services and how they and the economy prosper.

ecommend that:

Economic development plans are reviewed to ensure that they respond to the impact of the pandemic on residents a communities.

Economic Regeneration and Development Committee, working with the Health and Wellbeing Board, should consider t development of an Economic Inequalities Strategy for Wirral.

Employment support services and skills development programmes are available, accessible and sustainable to ensu income maximisation and support those most susceptible to job loss and job insecurity.

Partners embed a 'Health in All' policies approach to regeneration planning. We can use this approach to ensure that t wide breadth of health impacts of the pandemic is part of routine decision making and to reduce health inequalities.



eguard a healthy standard of living for all

Virral's Housing Strategy is reviewed to reflect the changing needs of residents and to address the hallenges that have emerged during the pandemic.

here is an integrated information and advice offer to enable people to access support when they need it.

uild on the progress made during the pandemic to support people who are homeless.

efine and streamline fuel poverty support pathways with partners across Wirral learning from COVII esponse.

elevant partners utilise Health Impact Assessment in spatial planning to identify risks to health and ways o mitigate them.



ease support for children, young people and families

commend that:

he impacts of the pandemic on our young people are examined to ensure that children and families have ne support they need to predict future areas requiring support and inform the offer for early years suppor om the Council and other partners

ontinue to develop the early help and intervention model underpinned by a prevention framework.

Nork with families, early years, schools, further and higher education sectors to ensure all children and purpous sectors to ensure all children and people fulfil their potential through a 'cradle to career' approach.

nsure that services are maximising opportunities to mitigate the impact of the pandemic on children oung people and families with a focus on physical and mental health.

eview existing support and services for our most vulnerable children, young people and families to ensurency are resilient, accessible and driving progress.



engthen action to address differences in health outcomes and vention

ommend that:

ocal health and care partners focus on tackling inequalities in healthcare provision - this is their direct responsibility and must be ne prime focus of their action.

ocal NHS partners ensure they can access high-quality data to measure performance on reducing health inequalities across ervices. This includes being able to breakdown outcome and performance data by deprivation and ethnicity.

HS partners use their role as local anchor institutions and the choices they make as an employer and a purchaser to reduce equalities.

reventative programmes and proactive health management for groups at greatest risk of poor health outcomes are accelerated cross key service areas as outlined within the NHS long-term plan (cancer, CVD, respiratory disease, mental health and laternity care).

he developing integrated care system and local providers have a named executive board-level lead for tackling health equalities and access training made available by local and national partners.

ocal NHS partners engage with and play a supportive role in multi-agency action to improve the social, economic and national relations in which people live.

ealth and care partners build on the focus on good infection prevention control during the COVID-19 pandemic to ensure we revent avoidable infections and keep people safe.



sidents and partners continue to work together

commend that:

ll partners should continue to build on the strong partnership work developed through our COVID-19 esponse by implementing the action emerging from the Health and Wellbeing Board Community and coluntary Sector work.

Il partners fully engage local people to co-design services and initiatives to enable residents to recover and nprove their health and wellbeing. We need to prioritise our more vulnerable residents who have beer isproportionately affected by COVID-19 and use tailored communication methods.

le undertake a resident listening exercise to learn from the experience of the pandemic to understand ocal people's experiences and aspirations for the future. This work should be a blueprint for developing a ustainable model for the use of insights gathered from local people.
