

#### Wirral VOLUNTARY SERVICE

#### What do the sector bring to Place?

- Innovative solutions to urgent and long term health issues e.g. Koala NW Sleep service reducing demand for medication, Wirral Multicultural Organisation and Wirral Change and other VCSFE orgs engaging hard to reach people to take up vaccines or screening such as the Covid vaccines, smear tests, flu jabs.
- Solutions to reduce pressure on the system e.g. Age UK
  Wirral's hospital discharge programme, Citizens Advice
  Wirral's Social Prescribers reduce the number of GP
  appointments taken for non medical issues, Ask Us Wirral
  Information and advice service dealing with financial and debt
  issues reduce anxiety and depression, One Wirral CICs
  Staffbox software to support flexible working pools



## Spotlight on Medicines

#### **Sleep Support Service**

**Delivery organisation:** Koala NW

Purpose: Sleep Management service for 200 parents of a child

who is autistic and has a sleep disorder

**Overview:** Accredited Sleep Practitioners offer one to one support or through a 6 week course and take a behavioural approach to prevent children being put on melatonin prescriptions, or for those already prescribed the medication so the dose can be reduced or stopped altogether

Funded: Beyond Transformation fund



## Spotlight on Medicines

#### **Sleep Support Service**

#### Impact of the service:

- 93% of the child/ren sleep better
- 50% reduction in melatonin use or stopped (already using melatonin)
- 70% not using melatonin do not want/need to start melatonin
- 96% have improved wellbeing attention, behaviours, school attendance
- 96% Improved parenting confidence, positive behaviours, boundaries, routines

Cost of Melatonin prescriptions for children and young people in Wirral from April to August 2022 was £295,000

#### Spotlight on Maternal health

#### **Ethnic Minority Hospital Advocacy Discharge service**

**Delivery organisation:** Wirral Multi-Cultural Organisation (WMO)

**Purpose:** To support patients from Ethnic Minority Backgrounds – to have timely safe discharge from hospital back into the community and prevent unplanned readmission.

**Overview:** EMHADS staff refer to WMO's health and well-being team, Community Development Team, to ensure any needs patients have in the community can be support and other services can be facilitated via interpreters where this is needed.

**Funded:** NHS Cheshire and Mersey



#### Spotlight on Maternal health

#### Case study:

Social Care requested an advocate for a mum with young daughter and has 28 weeks pregnant and has seeking asylum.

WMO made urgent maternity appointment with Midwife and scan. Mum has 28 weeks pregnant but baby has in distress, so delivered by C-section.

WMO provided translation services, bought clothes for mum and a cool bag and other equipment to be able to express safely when travelling to the neo-natal ward to visit the baby.

Liaised with organisations on mum's behalf - Social Care, Alder Hey Hospital, Neo natal unit, GP and hotel staff.

Outcome: Mum and baby both safe and accessing health services they need and community services helping to maintain good health and preventing worsening health and hospital readmission



## What do the sector bring to Place?

#### Partnership programme/delivery models including

- Family Toolbox organisations wrapping round the Children and families to deliver services that improve children's and families health and wellbeing
- Ask Us Wirral information and advice service
- Women's Health Network facilitated by One Wirral
- Mental Health Alliance delivering innovative projects to improve people's mental health and wellbeing
- Neighbourhood programme development



## Spotlight on Partnership working

#### Flourish Wellbeing Hub

**Delivery organisations:** Citizens Advice Wirral, Change, Grow, Live, Age UK Wirral, Wirral Mind and Involve NW

**Purpose:** Social Prescribing Hub that provides a holistic approach to dealing with patients and residents non-medical needs

**Overview:** Hub offers a range of group and one-to-one services including welfare and debt advice, Community Connector and Social Prescribing support, Mums mental health groups, Dementia groups, Drugs and Alcohol services, Counselling and Talking Therapies, Employment support.

#### **Funded:**

Funding for the premises is from NHS Property services over £1/2 million in kind support (rent or service charge)

Activities funded by a range of sources gained by the 5 organisations

#### What could the sector bring to Place?

- Delivery of more preventative services to reduce pressures on the system e.g. prevent unnecessary hospital admissions, reduce the number of GP appointments made for non medical issues including loneliness and isolation, support people to overcome non medical issues that are preventing them for being discharged from hospital, helping prevent mental health crisis reducing pressure on the need for inhospital admissions
- Reach into communities and people who are hard to reach. Range of organisations in our sector, and our position of trust with communities help us reach residents statutory organisations may struggle to reach
- Support strategic planning and decision making to make Place and Place organisations more relevant and impactful for Wirral



#### Sector successes to date

- Coming Together Strategy
- Wirral Mental Health Alliance development and work programme data workstream will help demonstrate the impact on the system such as on demand for mental health support
- Partnership working to support the delivery of the Neighbourhoods programme
- Representation mechanism up and running over 20 members elected to represent the sector to date across at around 15 meetings / committees / partnerships
- Reimbursement mechanism secured for ICS Place Representatives



#### Future outcomes/asks for Place to consider

- Place partners involvement in the Neighbourhoods programme
- VCSFE involvement in Winter Pressures preparation and longer term Hospital Discharge planning
- Focus on Place and neighbourhoods programmes, as well as acute system issues
- Consider how much of your current work is delivered
